Sport Shorts

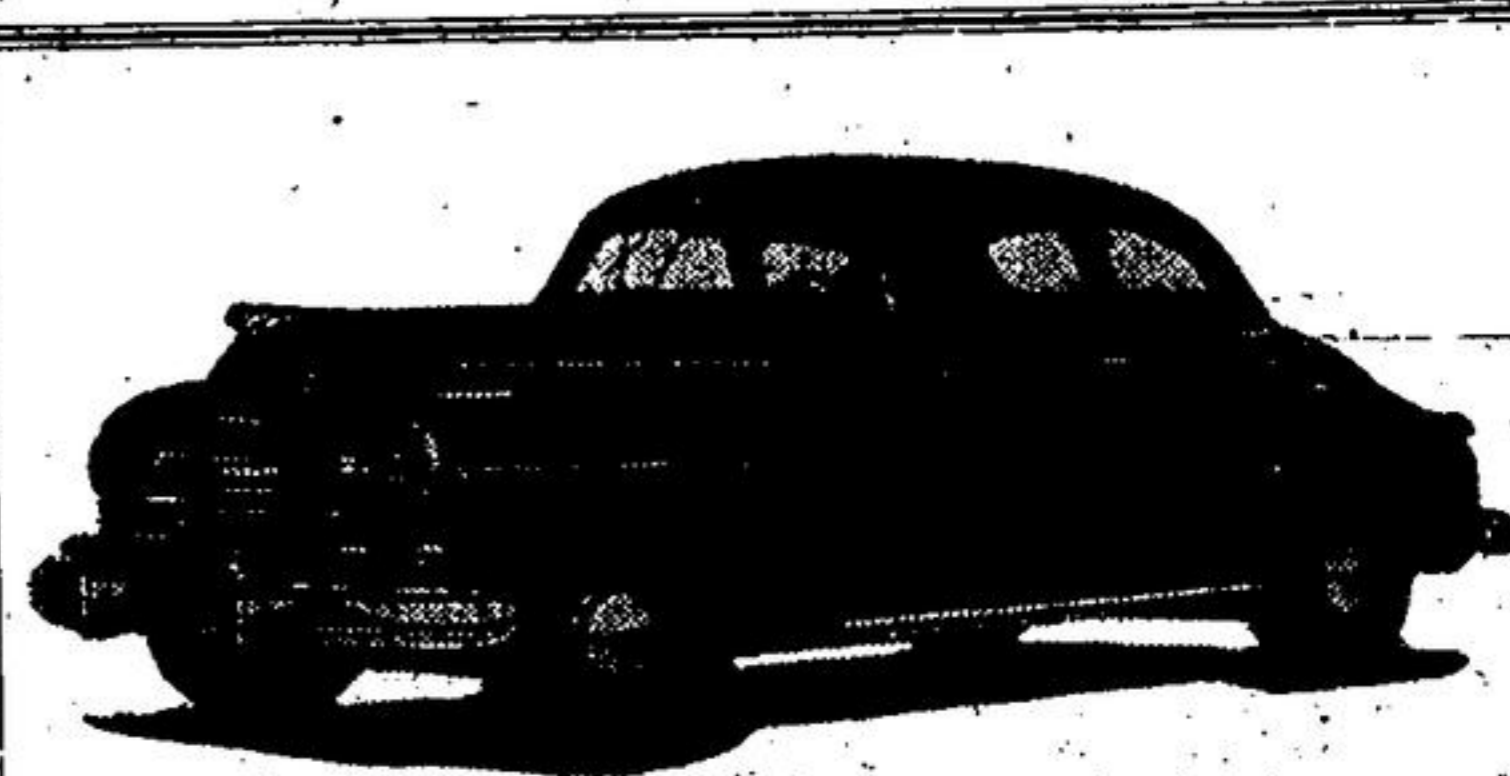
