GEORGETOWN IS 'TOWNSVILLE' IN CBC SUNDAY PLAY

The excellent reputation gained by "Stage 47", Sunday evening's Canadian Broadcasting Corporation play-house was further enhanced this week with the production of "John Lander Lived in a Ricketty House," written by Athol and Virginia Stewart. The play was a powerful drama about the adjustments which faced a young man whose battle mutilated face and voice had been replaced by plastic surgery. He comes to the new home purchased by his parents in the country near Townsville and eventually finds peace in the love of a young war-widow who has herself faced the same emotional struggles in adjusting herself to a different life.

The play was of two-fold interest to local radio listeners, inasmuch as the authors are son and daughter-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Stewart of Whitewood, and the Townsville locale included many familiar Georgetown features. Town clerk "Ed" Harrison, St. George's Church spire, the Herald and editor "Wally Bray", Maple Avenue and local historian, Miss "Billie Sims" gave Townsville an interesting local touch.

We have no doubt that the talented young Stewarts will hear further plays written by them produced on Canadian radio, and we congratulate them on this promising "opening night" on the Dominion network.

HARVEY WILLSON WAS GEORGETOWN NATIVE

Born and educated in Georgetown where he attended public and high school, Harvey William Willson died at his home in Highland Creek on Tuesday, February 25th. In his 49th year, he was the son of Mr. W. H. Willson of Clarkson and the late Mrs. Willson. He was a veteran of the first war, joining up in Toronto with the 201st Schoolboy Battalion and serving overseas with the artillery. He was an accountant and had lived in Merriton, Toronto and New York City, and had latterly been in the restaurant business in Highland Creek.

Surviving are his wife, his father, W. H. Willson and one sister, Mrs. R. W. McLeay of Clarkson and a brother, Charles Willson of Georgetown. Rev. R. C. Todd of Georgetown conducted the funeral service on Thursday from his sister's home, with interment being made in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Pallbearers included his brother-in-law, R. W. McLeay and Charles Kirk of Toronto.
