Foreign Flags over OTTAWA

TELL OF CANADA'S IMPORTANCE IN THE MODERN WORLD

20 years ago there was none...ten years ago only four . . . TODAY there are 24 Ambassadors, High Commissioners and Ministers representing their governments at Canada's capital. Striking evidence, that, of Canada's new place among modern nations!

We emerged from the war a far greater country than we ever were in pre-war days. Peacetime accomplishments are maintaining that new greatness today.



In the 80's we had a High Commissioner in London, and an Agent-General in France-but we had little say in our foreign affairs. Canada negotiated with foreign powers through the British Foreign Office, with Empire countries through the British Colonial Office.



le World War I Canada won the right to a separate signature to the Treaty of Versailles. That made 1919 an important date for us. Then, in 1931, we and the other Dominions gained recognition as equal partners with the United Kingdom.
