First Meeting of County Board of Health Held At Milton

The first meeting of the newly-appointed Board of Health of the Halton County Health Unit was held in Milton on March 20th. Those present were the four members appointed by the County Council, namely: Mrs. Mary S. Pettit, Freeman; Messrs. J. W. Higgins, Milton; Ken MacDonald, Georgetown, and R. M. Smith, Oakville; also Dr. R. G. Struthers and Miss Edna Moore of the Ontario Department of Health; and Mr. Norman R. Craig, Warden of the County, who was present at the request of the Board. Mrs. Pettit was chosen as Chairman of the Board, and presided at the meeting.

On the advice of Dr. Struthers, the Board arranged to advertise immediately for applications for the necessary staff, which consists of a Medical Officer of Health, a Supervisor of Public Health Nursing, six staff nurses and two sanitary inspectors. Miss Moore, who is Director of Public Health Nursing for the Province, informed the Board that due to the great shortage of qualified public health nurses, it is possible that the Unit may have to operate for a time with a smaller staff of nurses, but she expressed the hope that those Public Health nurses already engaged in the County would see their way clear to accept positions with the Unit, as their experience in the County would render their services particularly valuable to the Unit.

After some discussion of the most pressing problems confronting the Board, Dr. Struthers commented that from his experience with other Units he was satisfied that the general public would give its support and approval in an ever increasing degree as they see the programme of the Unit in operation. The aim of the Unit, of course, is that all residents of the County should enjoy the best possible health service, which will include (as well as school health supervision) the control of communicable diseases; maternal, infant and child hygiene; inspection and control of water, milk and food supplies; sanitation and health education, as well as many other phases of public health assistance.

It is hoped that the County Unit may be in operation by July 1st of this year.
