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The Editor's Column

THE NEED FOR A NEW SCHOOL

One purpose which the High School Open Night accomplished was to once more show those who attended the sad lack of proper facilities at the school for sports and assembly. It is not to the credit of high school boards of the past that something was not done years ago to provide accommodation for these important features of secondary education. We have every sympathy with the physical training staff who must carry on some sort of athletic program with no suitable room to do so and were amazed to see what had been accomplished in the way of gymnastics among the boys under these handicaps.

The need for a new school is something which has long existed and this year it looks as if some definite action will be taken, with both School Board and Council taking a much more active interest in the project. The remarks of the Board Chairman and the Mayor last Wednesday will be favourably received by those who have been urging action. We were particularly pleased to hear Mayor Gibbons express himself strongly against Georgetown losing its high school, for this would be a tragedy in a growing town which is rapidly becoming the most important urban municipality in Halton.

OLD BOYS REUNION

Advance word of two Old Boys' Reunions has been received from two district towns — Hespeler and Dundas, both of which are planning big affairs for the first week in July. The Dundas event will be a centennial celebration and features include an historical exhibit, horse show, Scottish games and beauty contest. Of interest to local fiddlers is the open contest with prizes of \$50, \$25 and \$15 and prizes for four-couple square dance entries of \$125, \$75 and \$50. Prime Minister Mackenzie King is expected to open the celebrations on Dominion Day.

Hespeler, too, is lining up a solid week of entertainment which includes band concerts and tattoos, lacrosse games and other sports, the Conklin midway shows and dancing nightly. Several thousand former residents are expected to attend and the committee has asked us to relay an invitation to those in this district.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE FOR CANCER SOCIETY

"A new war is being waged by Canadians everywhere—the war against cancer," says R. F. Bruce Taylor, chairman of the Ontario Cancer Society's Ontario membership drive which takes place during April.

"Our objective is to have a member of the Society in every Ontario home," he adds, pointing out that from April 1st to 30th no effort will be spared by the volunteer campaign committee to spread as much information about cancer — its symptoms and treatment as possible.

"Few people realize," says Mr. Taylor, "that one out of every three people with cancer can be saved — provided they see their doctor in time. Trouble with most people is, they refuse to face the fact that cancer can happen to them. They always think it's the other fellow who's unlucky. The Society's job is to make people conscious that cancer needs immediate medical attention — that an examination can't be postponed to a more convenient time. There are danger signals to watch for — and they are likely to occur at any time to anyone. Children aren't by any means immune, either."

Membership in the Society costs one dollar a person. Members receive up-to-date information about cancer signals and facts about research and treatment. HALTON CREAM PRODUCERS PLAN MEETING

The price being received by creamery shippers in relation to the returns for milk going to the whole milk markets is a source of dissatisfaction to the former group. The increased price of feeding stuffs and the scarcity of farm labour are two of the main reasons for the shortage of butter in Canada. The creamery producers of Ontario have given the matter a good deal of study and have prepared a scheme which if approved will come under the Farm Products Marketing Act for Ontario. In order that Halton Creamery Producers may have an opportunity of becoming familiar with the proposed scheme, we understand from Frank Wilson, of Aahgrove, chairman of the Halton Cream Producers' Association, that a meeting is being held in the Court House, Milton, on Friday, April 11th, at 8.00 p.m.

A representative of the Ontario Creamery Producers' Ass'n. will be in attendance to explain the pro-

posed scheme. At the same time all Halton creamery producers will have an opportunity of registering as producers and voting on the proposed scheme. The progress to date is the result of a good deal of work on the part of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture and the executive of the Ontario Creamery Producers' Association. Future progress will now depend on the action of the individual cream shippers.

MEAT RATIONING ENDS

Consumer coupon meat rationing in Canada was discontinued on March 27th. This announcement was made by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board following Finance Minister Abbott's statement in the House of Commons last week.

Board officials point out that although coupon meat rationing was suspended the Tuesday and Friday meatless days in all public eating places would be continued. The major savings in meat consumption made possible in this manner have constituted an important contribution to Canada's meat exports to the United Kingdom and other needy areas.

Price control over all meat will remain as at present and regulations governing slaughter permits and quotas will be continued.

In order to maintain overseas shipments at a maximum level housewives will be asked to institute meatless days in their own homes, and to buy only on the basis of immediate and real need.

One of the chief reasons for discontinuing the ration at this time, Board officials explain, is because of the difficulty in holding technical staff to continue a broad supervision of meat rationing. As other foods must still be kept under ration control the remaining staff is needed to carry out necessary enforcement and supervision of these other rationed commodities.
