Three tenders were received in response to advertising ocnducted the consulting engineer, C. R. Hagey, who was present at Monday's meeting. The Dick Construction Co., Welland, tendered on the sewerage system only at a price of \$337.000, almost \$100,000 higher than the next tender of \$243,000 from Bonvivere & Son. Toronto. The Scott, Jackson tender was \$202,000 in round figures. latter firm tendered \$148,380 for disposal plant with Bonvivere Son tendering \$90,000.

Consideration was given to splitting the tenders, accepting the two tids. Scott, Jackson said they would take the sewerage contract alone, but Bonvivere & Son were hesitant confirm their \$90,000 disposal plant tender unless they were awarded the complete job. Representatives of the firm conferred for an hour, but would not commit themselves that evening. saying they would submit their decison by letter in a few days.

Council was hesitant of further delay, and a tender terms, requiring certified deposit cheque, had not been complied with by the Bonvivere firm, the Scott, Jackson representative was questioned about revising his estimate on the disposal plant. When this was dropped from \$148,000 to \$131,000, was decided to give the complete job

to this firm. Mayor Gibohns paid tribute to the Work of Dr. C. V. Williams, the Medical Officer of Health, who for several years has been promoting installation of a sewerage system.
