WAS FORMER HYDRO SUPERINTENDENT IN BRAMPTON

George Harvey Ostrander, for many years Hydro Superintendent in Brampton, passed away in Peel Memorial Hospital on Friday, April 4th, following a lengthy illness. Born in Ertoville, a son of Mr. and Mrs. William Ostrander, he was in his 75th year. Well known in Brampton and the surrounding district, Mr. Ostrander was associated with the early hydro installation in Brampton. In 1900 he was employed by the Hamilton Electric Company, operated by J. O. Hutton. At that time carbon-arc street lights were in use in Brampton, the current being supplied from Ertoville. There were only 40 customers using electricity in the town in those days. It was about 1910 that Mr. Ostrander joined the Hydro in Brampton and supervised the installation of the present street lighting system. He was in the employ of the Hydro Commission until shortly before the outbreak of the second World War.

Mr. Ostrander was a member of St. Paul's United Church. Funeral services were held from the Funeral Home of the Brampton Funeral Service with interment in Brampton Cemetery. Rev. J. A. McDonald conducted the service.
