## United Church W. M. S. Thank-Offering

The Easter Thankoffering meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society of Georgetown United Church, was held on Tuesday, April 8th at 3 o'clock in the auditorium.

The president, Mrs. A. M. Nielsen, presided. The meeting was opened by quiet music, with Mrs. R. H. Wright at the organ. The Leader announced the theme of the Worship Service — "The Power of the Living Christ". Mrs. Houston of Cedarvale School and Mrs. J. McDermid conducted the Devotional — Mrs. Houston gave a meditation and prayer on "The Power of the Living Christ" and Mrs. McDermid read various verses on the Easter message interspersed with the singing of hymns.

Miss Florence Laidlaw sang in a most pleasing manner — "When I survey The Wondrous Cross".

The President, Mrs. Nielsen, introduced the speaker, Miss Florence Clearthue, missionary from India, now retired after forty years service in Evangelistic work at Kharua in Central India. (She pictured sights which form her reminiscences of her life in India, many of them typical scenes, colorful and picturesque, depicting men, women and children and nature in all its varied phases. Miss Clearthue told of how much more people are travelling now in India and of how the Indian Government is giving serious consideration to the diet of the people. Of particular interest was the story told of the Women's Movement — "The Women's Magazine" — the prominent part India's political life — describing a few of the outstanding women in India. Great numbers of India's women entered the war services as military nurses. Now they wish to continue to serve their country in the nursing profession. The missionaries need to be left free for their special work — medical or evangelistic or educational. There are great opportunities for young women as hostesses, health workers, executives, gardeners, etc. India needs our prayers at this time of great changes which are leading towards her independence.

Mrs. H. B. Hunt moved a vote of thanks to Miss Clearthue and those assisting with the program. Mrs. Nielsen closed the meeting with prayer. After the meeting the ladies enjoyed refreshments and a social hour.
