## G.R.C. Will Sponsor Midget Hardball League This Summer

Meeting in the Old Town Hall last Tuesday with President E. V. MacCormack in the chair, the Recreational Council made initial plans for a midget hardball league in town this summer. A new plan will be tried this year, with boys age 12 to 15 inclusive picking a team manager from among their own members. The project will be under the supervision of director "Hal" Newman. Games will be played after four in the park.

The G.R.C. will also enter a team in the Juvenile O.B.A. Lacrosse game up for discussion and Mr. Bob Caldwell, who is interested in this sport, was present about this. It was decided to first find out if there was sufficient interest in town to revive Canada's national sport here. Box lacrosse could be played either in the park or in the arena and it was thought it would prove popular with the fans.

The president and Bruce Mackenzie were named as representatives to attend the next town council meeting and ask that the director be given charge of the booking of the park in order that facilities there could be most fully used during the summer. Two new ping-pong tables will be purchased for Teen Town Hall as well as necessary baseball equipment. The G.R.C. will also purchase chairs for the hall and A. C. McBride was instructed to buy an initial 75, cost not to exceed \$2.25 a chair. Two hundred tickets were distributed for members to sell for Apprentice Productions' play the end of this month which the G.R.C. is sponsoring.

It was decided to set the first Tuesday in the month as the regular meeting night for the Council.

Fishing dates for the coming season, disclosed by Ontario game officials are as follows: Black Bass, from July 1 to October 15; Muskegon, July 1 to October 1; speckled trout, brown trout, rainbow trout, and aurora trout from May 1 until September 15.

## Fine Guernsey Bull Imported By Two Halton Breeders

Considered to be the finest bull calf to enter Canada in recent years, Stirlinggold Marquis, 7-month-old Guernsey, has been delivered to its new owners, M. T. McNabb and Sons of Georgetown and L. W. Chisholm and Son of Milton.

This fine animal, the first to be exported by the Stirlinggold Farms, Inc. of Stamford, Conn., is said by Lewis Mel. Merryman, well known United States Guernseyman, "to be one of the best ever to go to Canada."

This junior bull calf was sired by Fairlaw-Mamours Performer, junior herd sire at Stirling Farms, which was purchased from Fairlaw Farms for \$30,000. The fourth nearest dam averaged 906 lbs. of butter fat and sold for \$2,100 at auction. The dam, Marquis Douglasson Julia, sold for \$3,000 as a yearling.

This young sire is to be used at Arrowana Farm operated by L. W. Chisholm and Son, on daughters of Cairnpool Nancy Major, whose three nearest dams averaged 724 pounds of butter fat. He will also be used on daughters of Foremost Milton, who averaged 722 fat and Allan-Bé Shamrock Banner, 703 fat owned by Fraserdale Farm of Concord. He will also be used at Callumka Farms operated by M. T. McNabb and Sons on daughters of Donald Sequel Foremost 2nd, R.O.R. sire class A.D. 1st, five daughters which averaged 873 fat as three year olds. Also on daughters of Don Alda Hardwick Peer, 796 fat, and also on several daughters of Cairnpool Nancy Major purchased from Arrowana Farm, and now owned by Lloyd Davison, of Georgetown.

His paternal grand dam, Bright Lad Actress is now the best grand matron of the Guernsey breed in the United States, at the present time, according to cattlemen.
