Report of Halton Presbytery Meeting

The second regular meeting for 1947 of Halton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was held at Georgetown United Church recently (April 10th).

The election of officers was held, resulting in one change, that pertaining to the office of chairman.

Chairman—Rev. G. W. Porter, M.A., B.D. of Milton.

Secretary—Rev. N. J. Truax, B.A., of Carleton Place.

Treasurer—Mr. R. F. Sanderson of Oakville.

Convener of Christian Education—Rev. R. C. Todd, B.A., of Georgetown.

Convener of Evangelism and Social Service—Rev. R. R. Hare, of Millgrove.

Revs. A. W. Feasby and G. W. Porter were elected to the Settlement Committee of Conference.

Considerable time was spent discussing certain sections of the report of the General Council Commission on Christian Marriage and the Christian Home. Three resolutions were adopted:

1. We deplore weddings, the settings of which makes them publicity stunts, thereby demeaning the marriage ceremony and destroying its solemnity.

2. We call upon the Provincial Government to enact legislation requiring (a) pre-marital examination (health), particularly the serological test for syphilis (b) that the issuing of a marriage license be granted only on the satisfying of these health requirements.

3. We request the Provincial Government to make provision for the performance of civil marriages in the Province, so as to relieve ministers of any obligation to participate in marriage proceedings which are not in accordance with the teachings of the Church; also to avoid the necessity of persons not desiring Christian marriage with its obligations participating in such vows and declarations as the Church requires.

It is recognized that in regard to divorce, it is better to try to prevent circumstances arising which lead to divorce than to stress reformation.

The Missionary and Maintenance objective will be higher for 1947 than for 1946.

Rev. E. W. Brearley, of Simcoe, visited Presbytery as Conference representative of the Victoria University Finance Campaign, to present the claims of Victoria.

No changes in Pastoral Relations were announced by the Committee dealing with such matters.

Three successful Teacher Training Schools were held within Halton Presbytery during the last three months.

A WORD TO THE WISE

Georgetown Board of Trade, which is now affiliated with the Toronto Better Business Bureau has received a communication which we pass on as a warning to readers. An individual named Frank H. Powell allegedly representing "The Canteen" which is a paper that was published during the war and which discontinued publication last November, has been soliciting funds in Brantford to provide Christmas gifts for veterans in Veterans' Hospitals.

Upon communicating with Montreal, the Bureau was informed that Mr. Powell was instructed to cease soliciting last year. The Bureau further points out that anyone soliciting funds for such a purpose should be registered under the War Charities Act and be in possession of a permit from the Department of National War Services at Ottawa.
