Township Council Awards 1947 Gravel Contract

All members were present and Reeve George Cleave presided at the regular Esqueving Council meeting in Stewarttown on Monday. The clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law setting the salary of the road superintendent at \$1400 a year with \$28 monthly car allowance and 7c a mile when using his car on township business outside the township.

A one-fifth mill will be levied on all ratepayers assessed as farmers for the Federation of Agriculture. Spencer Wilson, sheep valuator, was paid \$4 for one trip, and expenses for funeral services for an indigent of \$30 were paid. Other accounts included: Roads, \$1434.04; Miller, \$56.45; charity accounts from Prov. of Sask. and Ontario Hospital, Woodstock, \$65.

The offer of R. E. Thompson, Georgetown, for a heating unit for the municipal building was accepted.

At a special meeting last Thursday, tenders for crushing and delivering 10,000 yards of gravel on the township roads were opened. The tender of G. C. Riddell was accepted. Price is as follows: crushing and elevating to bin, 60c a yard; hauling up to three miles, 32c a yard; over three miles, 10c a yard mile. Tender cheques of Sim Ireland and E. Armstrong were returned.
