To-morrow is Last Day for Flood Relief Donations

The British Flood Relief campaign is drawing to a close. In Georgetown, residents are urged to make their contributions of food, clothing and money by tomorrow, when the headquarters at the Old Town Hall will officially close. Chairman J. Arnott reports that a good response has been received to date, although many residences have not as yet joined in this good will gesture to the British people. Clothing donations have been particularly good quality and there have been many donations of canned goods in the boxes which have been placed in nine grocery stores in town and district. Arrangements have been made from central headquarters in Toronto to have local trucks transport the goods to Toronto.

In the township, pick-up of clothing from the various depots established, will be made on Saturday by the Lorne Scots Regiment and taken to a central agency at Malton. The township campaign has been directed by Reeve George Cleave, with the assistance of Cr. George Leslie, and Mrs. Graydon Chester. Ladies organizations in both town and district have been active in the work. In Georgetown, Mrs. Anne Lawson had charge of organizing, and assigned duty days to different groups, who have been on hand to receive clothing at the Town Hall. Events held in aid of the campaign have been sponsored by St. Alban's Ladies Guild in the Glen and the Hornby community and Limehouse W.I. are having a concert on Friday.
