If Oakville does not finish first or second the two top teams play off in a best of three games series and there are no further play-offs.

A letter from the Spinners and Weavers of Toronto was read, in which they expressed pleasure at the weaving display to be sent from Georgetown to the forthcoming Canadian National Exhibition. This display will be under the auspices of the Spinners and Weavers. The President urged the members who weave, to prepare a special display piece for this event.

Miss Ruth Home of the Canadian Handicraft Guild, gave a most interesting and instructive talk on the aims and objects of the Guild. She stressed the importance of the interest in any craft being intensified by a knowledge of the actual working of that craft. We learn by doing, experiencing things of the past by doing things of the past and thus obtain inspiration to be worked into modern objects of art. The Canadian Handicraft Guild was started in 1939, and has gradually extended its educational program ever since. The Government and the Guild are now working together to further the interest in crafts of all kinds, by having skilled instructors go out through the country where groups require instruction, by booklets which it is hoped will grow as time goes on, and by travelling exhibits. Miss Home displayed a small exhibit of leather work, pottery, weaving, metal and woodwork. Mrs. Beatty extended a vote of thanks to the speaker and presented her with a bouquet of spring flowers, and a delightful tea hour followed.
