THE ANGLER'S PRAYER
"Lord, give me grace to catch a fish
So big
That even I
When talking
of it afterwards may never need
to lie."

Fishing conditions, especially in the larger rivers like the Credit, have not been good for the fly fisherman, with the exception of a short period earlier in the spring. At that time conditions were almost ideal for wet fly and bucktail fishing.

Owing to the abundance of food available such as nymphs, etc., the writer of this column has found the German Browns, Speckled trout and Rainbows to be in very good condition. One large Brown Trout taken on a brown bucktail, had at least 250 or 300 nymphs of different sizes in his stomach.

LUCKY ANGLERS
Mr. Orval Raynor has been having good luck with the Brown Trout. His son Tom hasn't been sleeping either as far as hooking the big ones is concerned.

It is rumoured that Gordon Graham is a fly fisherman of experience after taking his first Brown on a fly. Eugene Logan of Glen Williams is another angler who is doing well with the Browns.

Freddie Tost of town is taking some very nice speckled trout on bucktails from some of the smaller streams.

Charlie Wilson took his limit of Speckled recently. Charlie, by the way, uses nothing but flies and always has very good luck.

A 5 lb., 10 oz. Brown was taken in the Credit by a Toronto angler recently. The length of the fish is not known, however he must have measured at least 23 or 25 inches.

A Brown that weighed 4 lb., 4 oz., length 21 ins. was caught by Harold Whitlock of Hamilton on the 1st Line, 5 miles above Acton. It was a male fish and very well developed.

Stocking
The Department of Lands and Forests has promised to stock the small streams around Georgetown. They know we have an Association here and if the club members want to better their sport it would be wise to show them that we are behind them one hundred percent by turning out for the next night of entertainment which will be in the very near future.

Things To Remember
A few things for beginners to remember:

Remember — When you catch a keeper be humane — don't put him in your creel alive.

Remember — To wet your hand before you remove a small trout from the hook. If you don't you might just as well break his neck and throw him on the bank, because he will die anyway.

Remember — That a Brown Trout grow faster than a Speckled Trout, so act accordingly. In other words, seven to ten Speckled is a nice catch for a small stream. A catch of 9" or 10" Browns in a larger stream should be put back to give them a chance.

Remember — One year old Brown Trout range from 5 to 9 inches.

Remember — Anyone can catch a small uneducated one where it takes

a smart angler or a very patient one to catch a big educated one.
Remember—When you are asked to show your catch to the Game Warden that he is only doing his duty and safe-guarding your sport for future sons.

Remember—If you don't want the lines and club, DON'T throw them to the bank. Throw them back for the trout to feed on when other food is scarce. Suckers of course are an exception, as they eat the Trout eggs in the Fall.

Size and Bag Limits
Brown Trout—5 per day not under 7 ins.

Rainbow Trout—5 per day not under 7"

Speckled Trout—20 per day, or not over 10 lb. in weight, not under 7 ins.

That's all for this week, so good fishing until next.
