Historic Hornby Church Crowded For Episcopal Visitation

 Two members of the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Norval, received the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation (Laying on of Hands) from the Right Reverend L. W. B. Broughall, Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara, on Wednesday, May 25th, at St. Stephen's Church, Hornby. Other members of the Norval congregation attended the service, which began at 11 a.m.

Immediately after the opening hymn, the Rector of Hornby, Rev. H. Leigh Pink, L. Th., requested Bishop Broughall to dedicate the decorations and improvements to St. Stephen's Church. Said the Bishop: "I congratulate the congregation most warmly upon the restoration of this historic church edifice. It is a real offering to God, and anything done to improve, repair and beautify God's House is worthy of high commendation." He then conducted a brief dedication service with special prayers. The Rector presented sixteen candidates for Confirmation. They were: (from St. Paul's, Norval) Mrs. H. Jolley, Mr. W. Finnamore; (from St. Stephen's, Hornby) —Alma Bradley, Edna Bradley, Eleanor Burton, Marjorie Burton, Gianna Bussell, Jean Clayton, June Laver, Mae Laver, Verina Price, Mary E. Thomson, Harry Burton, Edwin Laver, Earl Price, Craig Royce.

In his sermon, Bishop Broughall stressed the fact that the rite of "Laying on of Hands" was begun by the Twelve Apostles and was always accompanied by the gift of the Holy Spirit, to guide, strengthen, and give spiritual power to the life of those confirmed. The Apostles, who were the first Bishops of the Holy Catholic Church, appointed by Christ Himself, passed on their powers and authority to their successors, whom they appointed Bishops. In this way men in Bishops orders, deriving their authority from the Apostles themselves and linked to them by historic continuity, reached England about the year 200 A.D. and established the Church there. From this early beginning comes the great Anglican Communion, with its millions of members all around the world. The Church of England maintains the true teaching of the Apostles, the discipline and three orders of the true Apostolic Ministry — Bishops, Priests and Deacons.

The Bishop congratulated the candidates warmly "On being young! On being Confirmed! On being members of the Church of England in Canada! Yours is a very great and precious heritage — never let it go." The Rector, in his announcements, commended the men of St. Stephen's who re-roofed the church in spite of bitter cold winds and chilling rain. "The men who tackled the steeple deserve the name of heroes, for it must be the toughest shingling job in all Halton County," he said. At the close of the service the newly confirmed members were presented with Confirmation Cards and a photograph of the present Bishop.

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TORONTO PRESBYTERY W.M.S. HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING HERE

The 32nd annual meeting of section two of the Toronto Presbyterial Women's Missionary Society was held in Knox Presbyterian Church last Wednesday afternoon, May 28th, with a record attendance. After the opening ceremonies, presided over by Mrs. Edgar Robertson, Milton, vice-president of section A, and Mrs. W. McClure, Brampton, vice-president of section B, with Mrs. Oliver Hunter, Norval, appointed as secretary, Mrs. W. T. Sinclair welcomed the guests. The worship service centred on the word "Peace," which was the theme of the meeting, was ably taken by Mrs. A. J. Smethurst, Limeshouse, and Mrs. A. N. Miller, Brampton, with Miss M. Young at the organ, and Mrs. A. E. Cameron hymn leader.

Mrs. Leech, on furlough from India, was the special speaker. She vividly outlined her work, portraying the life of the people she lived with and showed the very great need of more missionaries to work in India if the people are to be won for Christ and fulfill his command — "Go ye therefore and teach all nations." Like ourselves, she said, they need to be loved, and it must be born in mind that they cannot be taught if they have no teacher and they cannot have teachers if we do not send them. She pleaded with those at home to strengthen their efforts and zeal in their missionary work. She very sweetly sang a hymn in their language and closed her address with a plea for the prayers of those at home to help in their work. She repeated the Lord's Prayer in the Indian tongue.

Offertory prayer was given by Mrs. J. E. Self, Norval. Miss Marion Hepburn, accompanied by Irlay McClure sang "I shall not pass again this way."

Roll call was answered by members standing from ten societies and greetings from Toronto Presbyterial were given by the president, Mrs. Carr, and a number of her secretaries spoke of their work. Mrs. Carr thanked all societies for the splendid reports sent in and asked that they continue by prayer and effort to do the work God has given them to do, reminding them of the words of Miss Hepburn's solo: "Mrs. C. Ferris, Streetsville, in well chosen words, thanked all those who had taken part and Mrs. Robert Marshall, Osnagh closed the meeting with prayer, after which all were invited to a social hour and delicious refreshments provided by the Georgetown and Limeshouse ladies.
