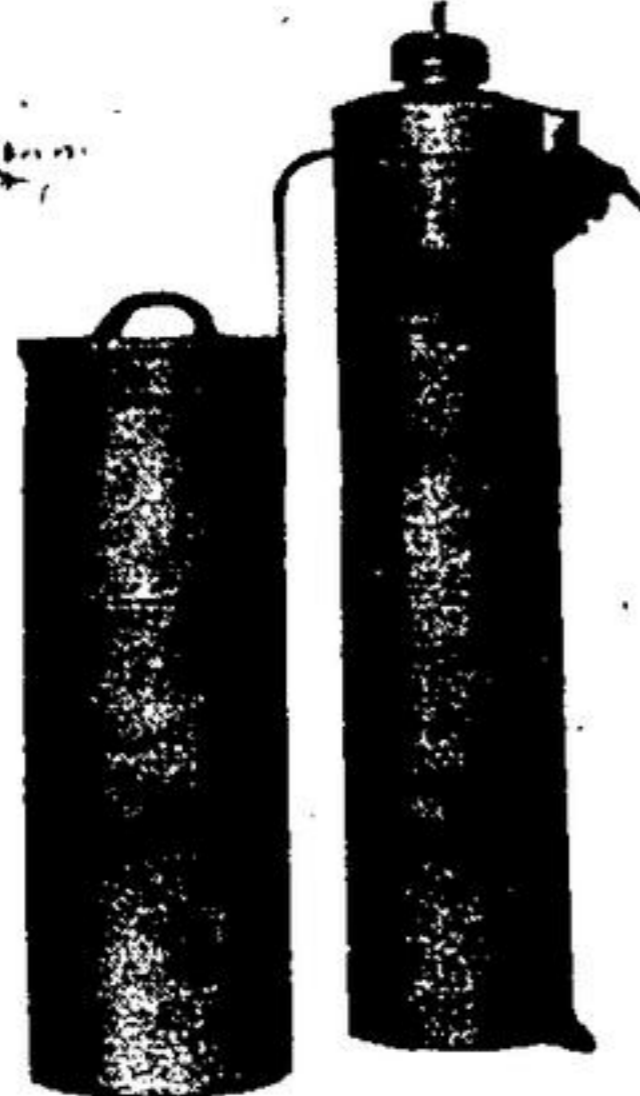

Anyone who is familiar with the habits and characteristics of these birds is aware of their great economic value, and encourages them to nest near fields and meadows.
