# The Editor's Column

CONTRIBUTIONS STILL ACCEPTABLE

As Recognition Day approaches, there is need for still more contributions to the fund for Georgetown's servicemen and women in order that the presentation cheques will be at least \$25. The fund, which was undertaken almost a year ago now has not met with the response it merited. Were it not for large contributions from a relatively small group in the community, it would be even farther away from the \$25 objective. There have been several factors which influenced the growth of the fund. Most of the industrial concerns in town have had presentations to their employees who were on active service and the firms and employees who contributed to their presentation have not felt themselves in a position to give as much to the recognition fund as they otherwise might. The fact that the fund was not started earlier has had an adverse effect - unfortunately the patriotic fervour which in wartime believes that "nothing is too good for our boys" dies a quick death in many hearts when peace comes. Third factor is one which would be present no matter what the gift - a disagreement with the form of gift, which in this case is money.

We have had no connection with the War Service Recognition Committee other than in our capacity as a reporter. We can say that at any meeting we have attended, we have been struck by the interest shown and time given in discussion by those members of the community who took it on their shoulders to arrange the presentation. We know that they feel they have gone the limit in asking for financial support. A canvass was made where no canvass should be necessary. Now we ask on their behalf that any who have not contributed (and there are many) and those whose contributions have not been commensurate with their ability to contribute (and there are many of these, too) get in touch with treasurer Ireland at the Bank of Commerce and boost the fund. It would be a glorious thing if the cheque could be not \$25, but \$30 or more.

. This editorial is addressed primarily to the merchants who have not been asked to contribute to other recognition funds. It is your chance to show that you are proud of the service record of Georgetown and show this pride in a tangible way.

#### THE LIST

Perhaps it is unnecessary to say that the Herald editor or staff has no connection with the preliminary service list which appeared last week and in this issue of the Herald. The War Service Recognition Committee is anxious that no name be missing when the presentation is made on July 1st and this was the only means of making sure that it was correct. The Herald volunteered to be headquarters for receiving additions to the list and these have been turned over to the committee for a decision, and some additions have been made in this issue. They ask that any further names be turned in by June 15th, in order that final arrangements can be completed.

Those to be honoured are men and women whose homes were in Georgetown at time of enlistment. This decision was made by the committee as it was felt that any former resident living in another community would be honoured there, and any resident of the Township would come under one of the various recognition committees set up in rural areas.
