India Tea an Interesting Event at United Church

In the school room of Georgetown United Church, on Saturday afternoon June 14th, an Indian Tea was held, arranged by the Woman's Missionary Society of the Church. Despite inclement weather, there was a good attendance and those who did come enjoyed a rather unique entertainment. The Sunday School room was transformed by decorations that were typically Indian. Many colored pennants were strung from pillar to pillar, the pillars representing coconut palms. There were exhibits on two sides of the room, each representing a phase of Indian life. There was the Goddess of Learning, a Buddha and incense burning, especially fine photographs taken in India, various types of posters, an illuminated map, a model of a thatched Indian house, Indian embroideries and many other curios. Attention was particularly drawn to the platform. This had as a background, a silhouette in black of The Taj Mahal, and a dais of gold and green on which stood a crystal globe. There were Indian shawls, and rugs and a skilful arrangement of shingling brass ornaments many of them holding lighted candles. An abundance of June flowers, from Professor H. L. Hutt's garden, added grace and perfume.

Mrs. J. W. Chapman of Burlington, president of Halton Presbytery came to assist with the program. She not only gave a short talk on India, but aided in dressing some of the children and grown-ups in lovely Indian saris. These added an interesting note of colour. All the various missionary associations of the church contributed either to the program or assisted in serving refreshments. Misses Joyce Hill, Marjorie Kentner, Jean Harley and Mollie Kelly, Alfred Toet and Kenneth Harrison, some of the Cedarvale Girls and members of the Mission Band, gave pleasure on the program.

Refreshments had an unusual touch in the way of curried rice with an Indian relish. Tea was poured by Mrs. J. B. Mackenzie and Mrs. Clarence Hayes.

Recognition Fund Still Only at \$6000 Mark

With Presentation Day rapidly approaching, the War Service Recognition Fund is slightly over the \$6000 mark. This was reported by treasurer R. H. Ireland at a meeting of the committee on Monday night, presided over by Mayor Joseph Gibbons. As there will be over 300 names on the presentation list, this means that scarcely \$20 apiece is available as yet for the presentation. This is less than 50 per cent of the original objective of a \$90 war bond. It was decided to accept donations no later than June 25th, as a few days would be necessary for making out cheques, etc.

A list of names submitted in answer to a request in the Herald was reviewed and several additions made to the preliminary list published the past two weeks. The committee decided to insert the final list of those to be honoured in next week's Herald.

A donation of \$650 was received at the meeting from Lt.-Col. C. B. S. Cousins. This represented funds held by the Rehabilitation Council originally presented to them by Georgetown United War Services and the Soldiers Comfort Committee. A town grant of \$500 is also included in the grand total.

Citizens are reminded that there is still time to make donations and the committee is anxious to have enough funds to give at least a \$25 present to the servicemen and women.

Accepted the tender of Fairclough and Co., Toronto for purchase of \$375,000 Town of Georgetown 3 per cent serial bonds for sewerage.

—Discussed the W. C. Pitfield and Co. tender, which was presented by a Georgetown man, Ian MacKenzie, who is employed with the firm. Council as a whole favoured giving him the business but the majority, including Mayor Gibbons, thought they could not justify a differential of \$1100 between the Pitfield and Fairclough tenders and that it was in the best interests of the taxpayers to accept the highest tender.

—Heard a motion presented by Armstrong and Thompson that Council endorse the recommendation of the Board of Parks to instal artificial ice in the Arena and ask the Board to attend the next regular meeting to discuss it further.

—Voted on an amendment that eliminated the endorsement of the idea. (Moved by Maclaren and Eason, Herbert, Armstrong and Thompson voting against.)

—Heard an argument between Reeve Maclaren, who said the original motion should be voted on as amended, and the Mayor, who ruled this could not be done. The argument was decided when a new motion was passed that the Board of Parks be asked to attend the next regular meeting.

(Moved by Maclaren and Eason)

—Instructed K. M. Langdon to prepare a draft building by-law for discussion at a future Council meeting.

—Received the news from Dr. F. R. Watson that the High School Board was considering adding agriculture and commercial work at the school next term, at an estimated cost of \$4000 to \$4500 which would be reduced by \$2000 yearly after the initial year. They were also considering a daily bus service for Esqueping students. Reeve Maclaren reported that County Council had just passed a by-law setting up a north Halton school area which would include Esqueping and doubted if Georgetown would be permitted to establish bus routes. Mayor Gibbons said it was time a High School—Council delegation interviewed the Minister of Education to see where the town stood and reiterated his opposition to closing the Georgetown School.

—Heard from Mayor Gibbons that engineer C. R. Hagey and Dr. Berry of the Ont. Dept of Health had looked over the proposed site at Cedarvale for the sewerage disposal plant. Dr. Berry had refused to sanction it, but had approved adjacent property owned by E. B. Tyers and a \$700 option for purchase had been taken by the town. There was considerable criticism of Mr. Hagey for this unforeseen move which would raise cost of sewerage installation, and it was decided to ask Dr. Berry and Mr. Hagey to attend an early meeting to discuss the matter.

—Were asked by Cr. Hale if it was correct for the town men to pump out cellars of private property owners. The mayor said they were carrying out an established precedent of public service.

—Discussed repairing the Old Town Hall. Cr. Eason had an estimate of \$1139 for necessary work including repairing the roof and estimated a heating system would cost \$2400.

—Cr. Herbert recommended that the Recreational Council take in the Boys Band and supply a professional to teach them. The Mayor said he would find out how far Council could go in granting funds to the GRC for such a purpose.

—Cr. Hale reported that he had been unable as yet to get a man to sell dog tags on a commission basis.
