Edward McWhirter, Provincial Paper's Man of the Month

ED McWHIRTER
A Papermaker's Papermaker
(Reprinted from Provincial's Paper)
Edward McWhirter, Superintendent of Provincial Paper's Mill at Georgetown, Ontario, for the past thirty-five years, is truly a papermaker of the old school. Born in 1873, on a farm just a few miles from the mill, Ed started working for the old Wm. Barber Brothers' mill (now Provincial Paper Limited) in 1888 as a cutter boy. Except for a few years working as a machine tender in the United States, he has been with this mill.

Ed McWhirter likes to recall the early days of the Georgetown mill when wood supplied the only fuel for it. Hundreds of cords of firewood were always to be seen. Throughout the working day, a steady procession of wagons laden down with wood could be seen wending their way to the paper mill.

At that time rag construction predominated in the manufacture of paper. In reaching the mills in carload quantities, the rags were sorted, foreign matter removed, cut, and then dumped into rotary boilers to be cooked. After cooking for fourteen to sixteen hours in a solution of soda ash and lime, the rags were put through a series of washes to remove dirt and chemicals. Refining machines were unheard of at that time. After the paper was made in beaters, it was ready for the paper machines.

Ed McWhirter is proud of the fact that the Provincial Georgetown mill was one of the first companies to transmit electrical energy in Ontario. It was generated in a power plant the company erected on the Credit River. Hunting, fishing, home-gardening and curling occupy this papermaker's spare time. Unlike most fishermen he can boast of his own fishing preserves. A lake on his farm in Markdale is well stocked with speckled trout which Ed does his best to remove.

The Masonic Lodge, the Knights of Pythias, the Lions Club, Oddfellows Lodge, Georgetown Curling Club and the Board of Trade, all have Ed McWhirter's name on their rolls as a good fellow. Provincial Paper Limited too know him as a good fellow, and also as a top drawer paper maker.

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY

The regular monthly meeting of the Halton Society was held in the Society Office, Milton, on June 10th, with ten Board members present; Mrs. M. E. Nixon presiding. Accounts to the amount of \$941.65 were passed for payment.

Owing to increased Child Welfare work within the County and the demands upon the Society, the matter of an Assistant Field Worker was under discussion. This matter was left for further consideration.

Three legal adoptions were completed during May, and at the end of the month the Society had 10 children under supervision.

Ten new cases were included in the Protection Cases open at the end of the month. During May one child was permanently committed to the care of the Society; four were recommended for a further period of twelve months; and wardship was terminated in the case of six children who returned to the care and custody of their parents.

The Society gratefully acknowledges a recent donation of a complete layette from the Limehouse Women's Institute and a very splendid supply of clothing from the Ashgrove Women's Institute.
