**WITH THE ANGLERS**

 The Anglers who were fortunate enough to fish the hot spots last week must have had good luck as conditions were ideal. That is until Friday evening, when once again the rivers went on a rampage. The few rivers that stay clear after rains of ten produce better catches when high than when they are low. The reason for this, of course, is the fact that the trout are looking for food and strike everything that comes near them. No. 8 wet flies are very good under these conditions, also small streamers.

**Light and Wind**  
 When water conditions are ideal, light and wind are still needed for good fly fishing — especially the wind. A north wind will, as a rule, put the fish down. An east wind is a little better, but not good. A south wind is good. A west wind is perfect. And last but not least a south west. Now there is a mixture that compels the Angler to go behind a tree to attach the fly. Apparently, it has the same effect on the Sir Isaac Walltons, for just watch them sally forth. It just seems natural, as if there is a mutual agreement between the trout and them, that it is a fire day for matching wits. So brother, what have you in that fly box.

**Wet Flies**  
 There are thousands of wet flies alone. These can be divided into a few groups such as small flies, that resemble natural insects. These can be fished with a cast, up and across the stream. They are then allowed to drift down natural like, the same as a drowned one would. The angler has to watch for the slightest twitch of the line to tell him a trout has struck. A quick strike back is necessary to hook the fish. Otherwise, he will spit it out as soon as he finds it's an imitation. They can also be fished, by casting up and across the stream, and retrieved in short jerks. The trout hook themselves in this case because they are striking with the line tight. The latter way is of course unorthodox for this type of fly.

**Despairs** are best fished with the retrieve. These flies are an imitation of insects that hatch out on the bottom of lakes and streams. The retrieve method is always used for them. That gives the trout the impression that they are slowly making their way to the top. They are very effective when flies are hatching in the evening.

The crane fly is also very effective when fished just below the surface. The trout take these for a large water spider or something just hatched out. These last two flies mentioned are best fished in water not too fast. They are also very good in large pools and lakes. They have a very lifelike appearance in the water.

**Proper Line for 9 ft. 6 oz. Fly Rod**  
 The above seems to be a common rod in use today. A level line that handles very nice is a size E, or an H.E.H. double tapered one. This is of course for a rod with fairly stiff action.

Balanced tackle is very essential for good fly fishing. It means you can get more line out with little effort. It's better to cast against a wind than with, and the casts are more accurate. The column so far is based more or

less on the writer's experience over several year of fishing. He will also be glad to help all he can those who are interested in the sport. Time and money can be saved if one knows just what line and reel to get for that pet rod. Remember fly fishing is not just a rich man's game.

After inspecting his prize, he found it was living up to its reputation after attaining a certain size of being a cannibal. It had one seven inch trout in its throat and an 8" trout in its mouth. Quite a mouthful for even a 19" trout. (15" of fish.)

**Large Catfish**  
 A large catfish or bull head, was caught, or I should say played an angler, at the paper mill dam for about five minutes. The angler then got the help of a pal. A short time later it was beached. It was the largest that was caught there for some time.

**FREE SERVICES FOR FARMERS**

For the purpose of assisting the farmers of Canada to meet the economic problems with which they are constantly confronted and to carry on the industry of Canadian agriculture to the advantage of the nation as a whole, the Dominion Government has several millions of dollars invested in free services and facilities.
