GEORGETOWN NATIVE DIES IN CALIFORNIA

Rev. James F. Evans died suddenly June 17, in Sacramento, Cal. Mr. Evans, an old Georgetown boy was a son of the late John Evans and Janet Frazer. He was a graduate of Toronto University and Knox College later obtaining his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Yale University. For a number of years the late Mr. Evans was Professor of Education at Knox College. His early ministry was spent in the Mission Fields of British Columbia and latterly in First Presbyterian Church, Springfield, Massachusetts. For health reasons he settled in California where he resided for the past twenty-five years. The late Mr. Evans was the eldest brother of Mr. Walter Evans, of this town.

What Council Did

ON WEDNESDAY, JUNE 18

—Met with engineer C. R. Hagey to discuss location of the sewage disposal plant and decided to purchase property for this purpose from E. B. Tyers on the 8th Line, for a price of \$700.

(Moved by MacLaren and Hale)

—Instructed the Clerk to write to the Board of Cedarvale School asking permission to run a trunk sewer through the property.

(Moved by MacLaren and Eason)

—Heard from Mayor Gibbons that the Dept. of Health would allow construction of wartime houses on the town-owned Reservoir Park at the foot of George Street, provided sewers were installed and the town water chlorinated.

—Asked the Roads chairman to interview P. L. Thompson regarding sale of a town-owned grader to him for \$45 last year, to see about refunding the purchase price and having the grader returned. Deputy-Reeve Armstrong brought up the question when he said the town could make use of the grader as it was not always possible to get the county grader when it was required. He criticized sale of the grader, which had been sold by last year's mayor and reeve without sanction of Council. Mayor Gibbons and Crs. Goodlet and Eason, all members of the 1946 Council, said they had known nothing of the sale.

—Authorized Cr. Hale to secure a person to canvass the town to sell dog tags. A 50c per tag commission was suggested.

(Moved by Herbert and Armstrong)

—Discussed Main Street parking, when Deputy-Reeve Armstrong asked if something could not be done to discourage trucks from angle parking. Reeve MacLaren said it would be a good idea to paint heavy white traffic lines at the dangerous crossings at John St. and the highway and Main Street and the highway.

Some discussion took place on Council's request to the Gray Coach Lines to re-route their buses up the highway, and Reeve MacLaren and Cr. Herbert said they believed Council at times did not give enough thought to resolutions. Cr. Goodlet said he didn't believe in re-hashing old business and that for one didn't put his hand up and down without thinking, when motions were voted on.

—Gave third reading to the sewerage debenture by-law.

(Moved by Lyons and Thompson)

—Talked of the School Board Council deputation which was to go to Toronto the next day to interview the Dept. of Education about improvements in the local High School. Mayor Gibbons said he hoped any members who were going had the express purpose of maintaining the school here at all costs. Reeve MacLaren said that he objected to being told what he was to do and that if he attended the meeting he would feel free to say what he thought. When the mayor said that if the Reeve did not favour the idea the proper procedure would be for him to organize his own deputation, Mr. MacLaren said he was just as opposed as the rest of the Council to locating a school at Spessyck, but that he did not stand for maintaining the school here no matter what the consequences, and that he was for the best education that we can get. When the Mayor said it would be extremely embarrassing if the deputation included anyone who was going to injure the town's case, Reeve MacLaren said he didn't think the town would be embarrassed by anything he might say.
