be doubt as to whether Dr. Stiles was still sanitary inspector now that the County Health Unit had been organized. The Clerk was instructed to inform Dr. Stiles that he still had the job and that it was in his power to see that conditions were remedied.

Mayor Gibbons objected to the Provincial Police bill for car allowance (1300 miles at 6c, totalling \$78 for June). The estimate had been \$200 and at this rate it would be closer to \$1000 for the year. The June report, prepared by Corporal Reynolds and presented by Cr. Goodlet showed 29 investigations, 3 one dollar fines for parking infringements, and an order to a local manufacturer to pay back wages due. \$10 had been recovered of \$100 in stolen property.

Ordered a fire siren on approval to be installed somewhere in the factory district. Deputy-Reeve Armstrong believed there should be a siren there as most of the firemen work in the mills and the downtown siren cannot always be heard. The siren will cost \$150.

Asked townspeople to limit the use of water for lawn sprinkling to the hour of seven to eight in the evening during the summer months. Cr. Herbert said that last Saturday there wasn't enough water pressure to run the fire system five minutes had it been necessary and that the seriousness of this situation should be impressed on the public.

Asked the Lions Club to cooperate in taking a proper town census. Council believes the town is well over 3000, although official figures vary from 2400 up, and that a town census would show the correct figure.

Mayor Gibbons asked the Clerk to prepare a half-yearly statement for the next meeting, showing each committee what money had been spent and where it stood on its estimates.

An enquiry by the Women's Institute was received regarding public toilets in the new Municipal Building. There was a feeling among councillors that garages and restaurants took care of this and that public facilities were too difficult to maintain.
