## SALMON SALAD

1 cup cold boiled salmon 1 cup shredded cabbage

# BERRY TURNOVERS

Cut circles of puff or flaky paste three inches in diameter, having the paste more than one-eight of an inch thick. Moisten half the edge of the circle with cold water and in .the center lay a teaspoon of thick raspberry jam. Fold one-half of the circle over the other, making edges meet. Press closely and mark with a fork dipped in flour. Brush with beaten egg, prick the top with a fork and chill before placing in the oven. Bake in electric oven for 15 mins, at 450 degs. F. (Other fruit may be used in the same way).

## TAKE A TIP

Dip graham wafers in thick chocollate syrup. Stack 4 together on individual plates and keep in electric refrigerator until serving time. Top with whipped cream tinted pink and sliced bananes.

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
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"FOREST FIRE" after a painting by J. M. Hanes
