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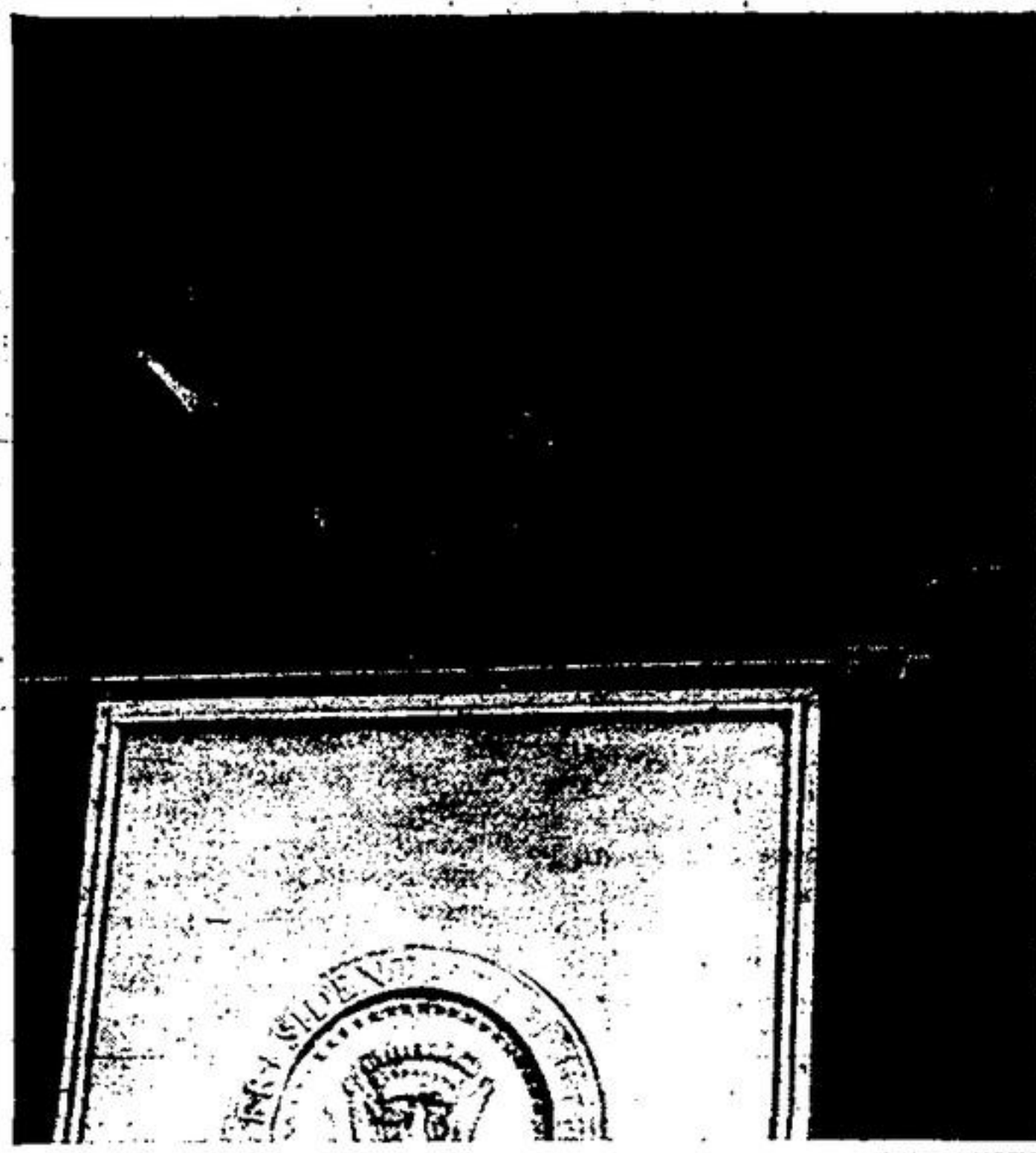

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MISS M. G. CARLSON WINS SCHOLARSHIP AWARD



With an outstanding record as a student, Miss M. G. Carlson, honor graduate in business administration at the University of Western Ontario, has been awarded the J. William Horsey Scholarship, valued at \$3,000 or \$1,500 a year for the years 1947 and 1948, plus travelling expenses. The award is open to graduates in Business Administration, Commerce and Finance at any Canadian University. Announcement of the 1947 winner has been made by Dr. K. R. P. Neville, Dean of Western.

Miss Carlson attended school at Enno, Ontario, and Fort Frances High and Vocational School, taking her Junior and Senior Matriculation and winning many public speaking awards. As a student of Western she was secretary and president of the debating society, editor of the Student Handbook, Vice-President of the Players' Guild, chairman of the Women's Council and active in other capacities in which she showed marked organizational ability. As a winner of the scholarship which was established in 1945 to promote research into food production costs, Miss Carlson will combine post graduate study at a Canadian or United States university with special investigation of every phase of food distribution. She is a resident of London, Ontario.
