Lloyd G. Nault, former manager of Carroll's Store here, is manager of Carroll's Store in Dunnville which reopened last Saturday after extensive alterations. The new store features a meat department, the first in the entire Carroll's chain of stores.

Mr. Nault started with Carroll's in 1934 in his home town of Guelph, taking over the management of the Georgetown Store in 1939. In 1942, he enlisted in the RCAF and served overseas for 3 1/2 years in Britain, France and Belgium. Returning home in January, 1946 he was placed in charge of the Dunnville store, where as the Dunnville Chronicle says "his amicable nature has won for himself, and Carroll's, a host of friends."
