Low, clear water last week gave the fly fishermen good chances to creel some nice ones. Small dry flies, wet despairs, and large streamers and bucktails seemed to be the best lures. A good many large browns were raised but not caught, it is reported. These large tackle breakers apparently are still hard to catch as usual.

INTERESTING FACTS
During a normal year, the total distribution of hatchery-raised game fish from Ontario's 26 fish-rearing establishments is 800,000,000.

Offenders against fish and game laws in Quebec contributed an average of more than \$5,000 per month during the last four months of 1946, according to a report from the Fish & Game Dept.

Canada's ocean fishing grounds cover 200,000 square miles and our inland lakes comprise more than half the fresh water on the planet.

Canadian forest fires destroy 400 million cubic feet of lumber per year, or 2,500,000 acres. This represents a yearly path of devastation a mile wide all the way from Halifax to Vancouver and northward to the edge of Alaska.

Where do Canada's 9,000 annual forest fire outbreaks come from? Chiefly from a collection of human hands; and the ownership of the lands is listed by these percentages: campers 18, smokers 16, settlers 16, lightning 18, railways 4, unknown 10, incendiary 7, miscellaneous 11. Except for lightning, almost the whole of the others (82 percent) belongs to the category of the guilty human.

The above facts have been quoted from an article called the Red Raider, by Robson Black in the Carling Conservation Digest for July.

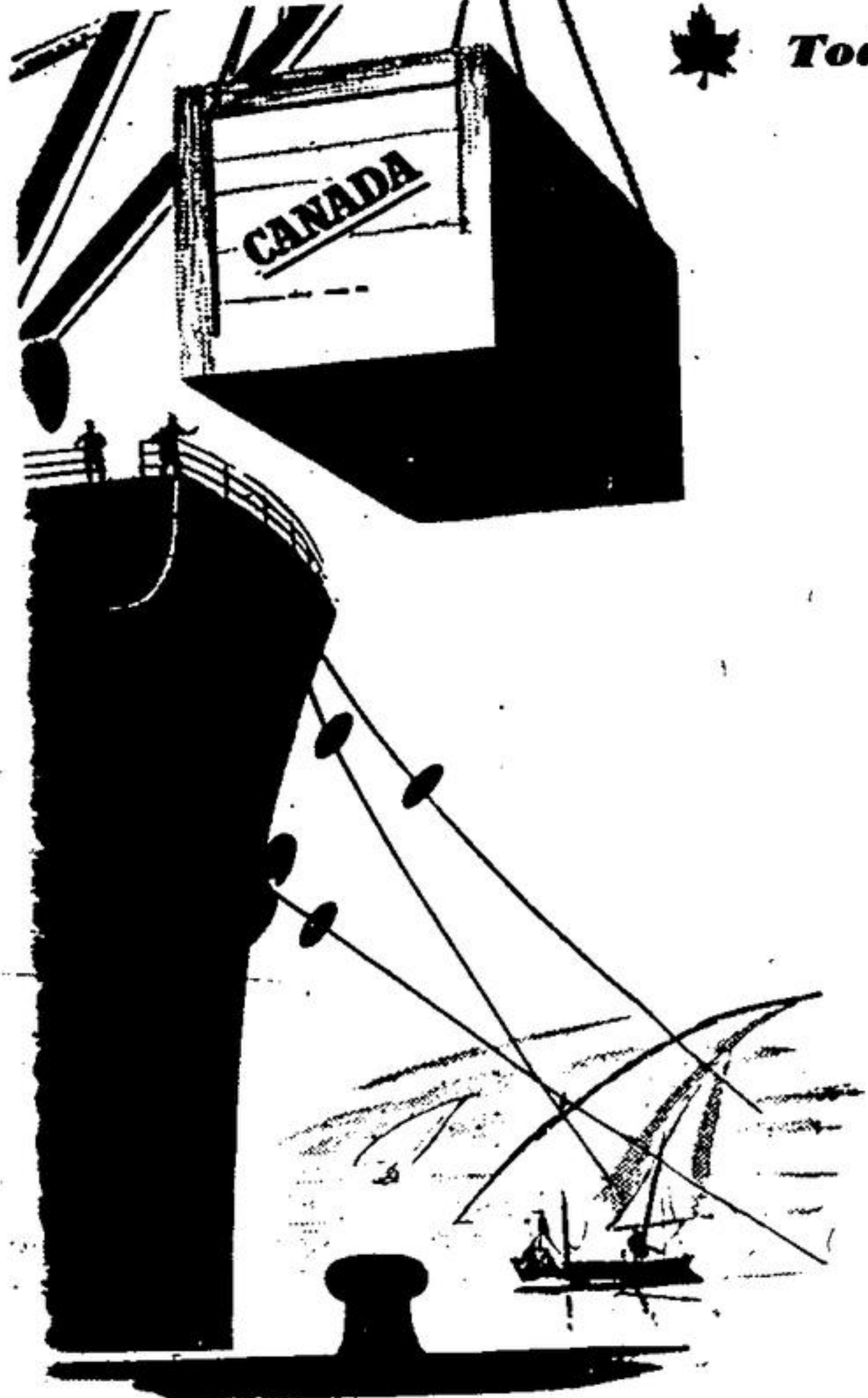

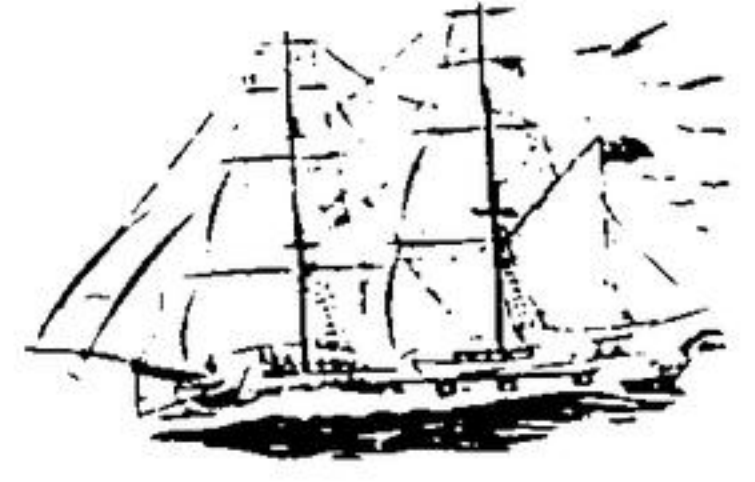

GERARD HEROD of Oakville, Ont., was a clerk in a department store nine years ago. At the age of 24 he added \$400 savings to his natural interest in machinery and began to manufacture red clay flower pots. Initial difficulties were overcome by determination and his native Canadian enterprise. Today his firm, Dominion Pottery Limited, produces more than a quarter of a million dollars worth of pottery a year.
