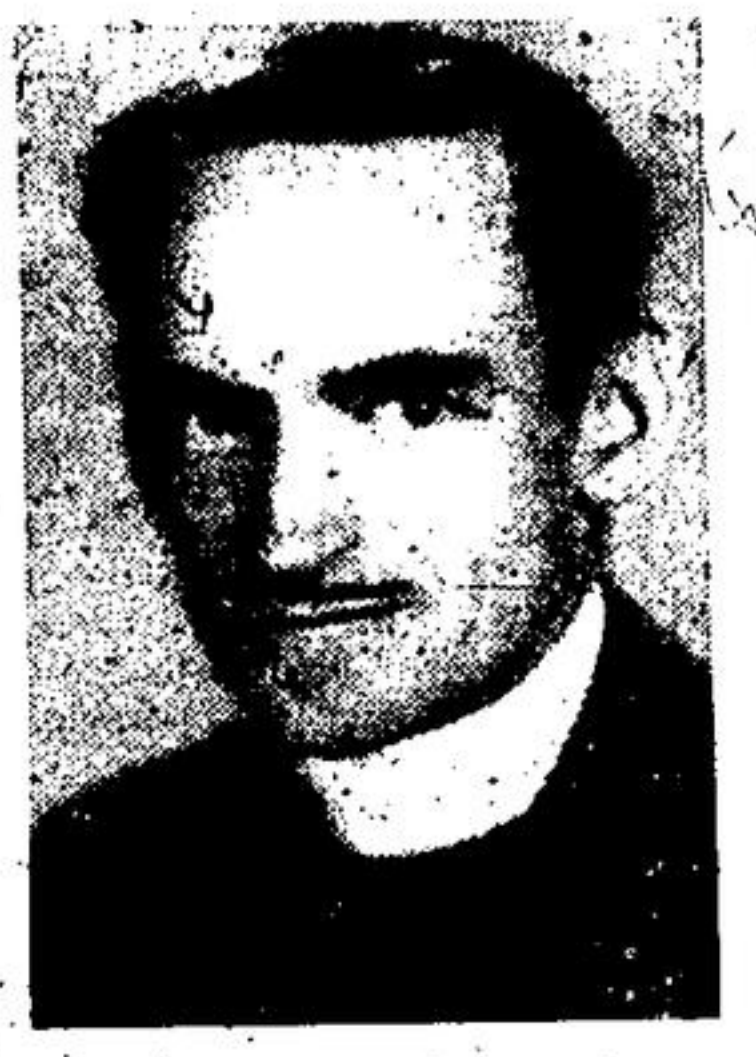
TOWNSHIP COUNCIL
