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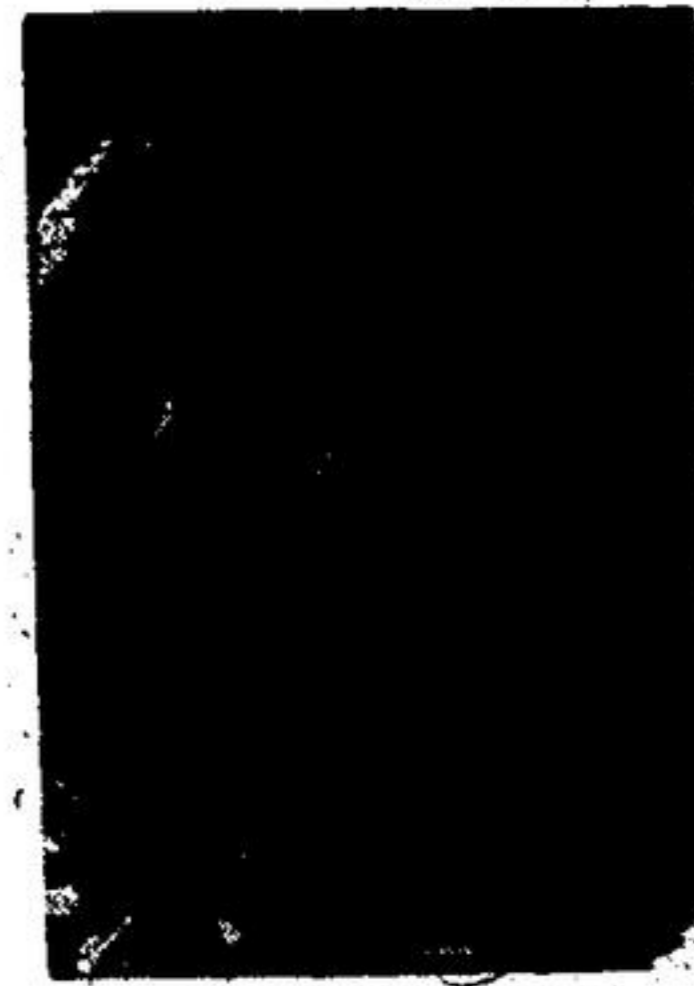
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Mrs. Ben Petch Dies in 80th Year

Injuries from a fall which she suffered in April proved fatal for Mrs. Benjamin Petch, who passed away in Hamilton on Tuesday, September 2nd. Formerly Marjorie Louise McKane she was born eighty years ago at Linwood in Waterloo County, a daughter of the late James McKane and Marjorie Beggs. She received her schooling there and moved with her family when she was a girl of 17 to Chinguacousy Township near Terra Cotta. Fifty-one years ago, she married her late husband, a well-known farmer and auctioneer in Chinguacousy who predeceased her in 1929. She had made her home in Georgetown for the past several years, sharing an apartment with her sister, Mrs. H. G. Clark, until her accident last spring. Mrs. Petch attended Union Presbyterian church during her residence in that district and had attended Knox church since she moved to Georgetown. She is survived by an only son, Frank of Georgetown, who has followed his father's trade as auctioneer and one grandson, Ross. One of a family of eight, she was predeceased by three sisters, Mrs. William Rennie, Mrs. T. E. Reid and Mrs. Thomas Anderson. Surviving are three sisters and one brother, Mrs. H. G. Clark, (Anne) of Paris, Mrs. R. C. Gibson (Emily) of Hamilton, Mrs. George S. Fraser (Ada) of Hamlet, Manitoba, and James A. McKane of Union.

The funeral service on Friday from the McClure Funeral Home was conducted by Rev. C. C. Cochrane, assisted by Rev. R. C. Todd. Mrs. Howard Wrigglesworth sang "The City Four-Square" during the service. Pall bearers were W. A. Wilson, Albert Dolson, Andrew McDonald, Thomas L. Leslie, Fred C. Thompson and Thomas L. Lyons. Interment was in Glen Williams Cemetery.

BROWN TROUT
This fish has a variety of names such as Brownie, English brown trout, European brown trout, German brown trout, Lock Leven trout, Von Behr trout.

The first shipment of eggs came from a Von Behr of the German Fisheries Society in the year 1883, and for some time they were called Von Behr trout. Later, shipments from Scotland of a subspecies of Brown trout known as Loch Leven trout were transplanted and these have interbred with those of the first transplanting, thereby confusing the issue of the true Brown trout.

The Brown trout prefers larger waters than the brook and can survive in warmer waters. Therefore we have good fishing in a good many of our streams where otherwise we would not have any.

WORLD'S RECORD BROWN TROUT
It was caught on rod and reel by W. Muir at Loch Awe, Scotland in the year 1886. It weighed 39 1/2 pounds. This specimen was caught in a large body of water and by no means does it go to belittle any 6 or 7 pound Brownie that was caught in this locality.
