Rural Hydro Will Improve Service

G. S. Paris, rural superintendent of the Hydro Electric Power Commission tells us that the Check Line and Ballinad areas will enjoy improved electrical services when changes now in progress have been completed. Heavier wire will be strung from No. 7 highway along the south end of Georgetown to the corner of the Check Line and the 7th Line. Esqueting. From there to Ballinad the existing single-phase line will be changed to a three-phase circuit of heavy aluminum wire. The changes will also extend from Ballinad into Erin and Caledon Township.

There will be several power interruptions in these sections commencing about September 15th while the work is being carried on. However, the final result should compensate the inconvenience sustained.
