Take Heed of These Precautionary Rules

POLIO

- 1** BE ALERT for any symptoms of the common cold, fever, headaches, upset stomach, constipation or diarrhea, nausea, stiff neck or back, aching arms and legs.
- 2** AVOID contact of children with new groups of people. Avoid letting your children attend gatherings where they come in contact with people they are not accustomed to being with.
- 3** SUDDEN chills of the body is dangerous at this season when heat and weariness invite a plunge in the lake or old swimming hole. Don't take any chances with chill or polluted water.
- 4** AVOID over-exhaustion and extreme fatigue. The person who is exhausted is very susceptible to many ills which one fresh and rested can throw off. Keep resistance strong.
- 5** TONSIL and adenoid operations no longer are vacation activities. From late spring to early fall, especially during epidemics, avoid such operations until your doctor deems it wise.
- 6** KEEP CLEAN and make sure your food, water, and milk are fresh and clean. This is no time to eat fruit and vegetables direct from their store stands. Pare them as a precaution.
- 7** KEEP THE home sanitary. Don't let your garbage accumulate or stand uncovered. Get rid of flies and mosquitoes and remove their source of breeding in your neighbourhood.

From now on though the earlier part of fall, poliomyelitis—infantile paralysis — will be at its height. Because of this health authorities throughout the nation are offering precautionary measures so that parents and others will have some background and constructive knowledge of what to do.

The Province of Ontario is still in the midst of an increased number of cases. No one knows how far the disease will spread nor who will be the next victim.

The precautionary steps above will help prevent the spread of disease. Protect your children and yourself. Help protect the children of others. Keep the destroyer of youth down. Co-operate with the health authorities and use good common sense in everyday living.

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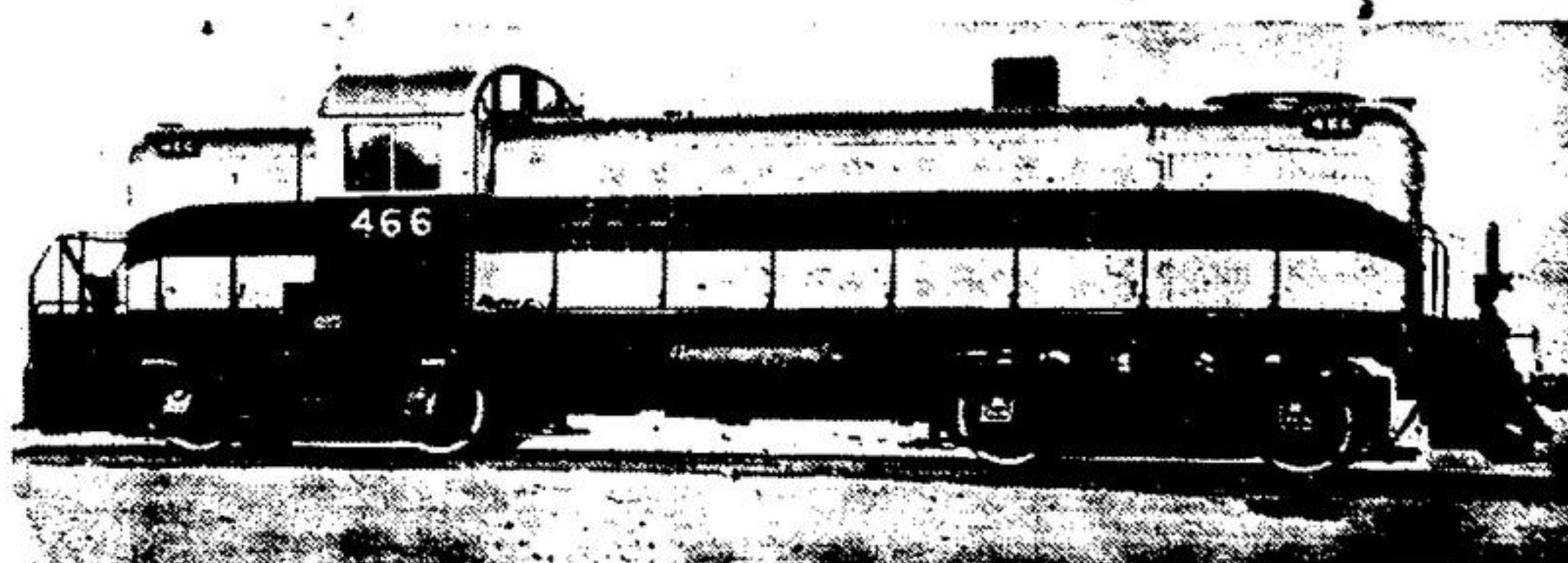
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FOR CANADIAN PACIFIC TEST — Pictured above is a 1,500 horsepower diesel road engine of the type which will be tested early in April under actual traffic conditions by the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The locomotive can be used singly or in connected units of two or three, developing full 4,500-horsepower in the latter case. Future of the steam powered "iron horse" in Canada may well depend upon results of these tests. The Canadian Pacific is already turning heavily to use of diesel locomotives for yard use throughout the system.

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
