As everyone knows, the trout season closed on September 15, and from all reports it was a poor one compared to other years. Most of the large trout were taken on bait. Probably the largest one caught in Ontario was the 14 pound brown caught in the Big Head river at Meaford. The largest one for this locality was probably the 6 pound, 4 oz. brown taken at the Credit Forks.

CLOSING DATES FOR OTHER SPECIES

BLACK BASS — July 1st to Oct. 15th, except River St. Clair, Lake St. Clair, Detroit River, Lake Erie, and Niagara River from Lake Erie to Niagara Falls; June 25th to Dec. 15th.

MASKINONGE — July 1st to Oct. 1st, except River St. Clair, Lake St. Clair, Detroit River, Lake Erie and Niagara River from Lake Erie to Niagara Falls; June 25th to Dec. 15.

LAKE TROUT — No close season in Great Lakes, Georgian Bay, North Channel, Bay of Quinte and River St. Lawrence.

(A) INLAND WATERS — South of and excluding the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing from November 6th to Oct. 5th next following.

B. North and west of and including the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing. No closed season when taken by Angling.

YELLOW PICKEREL and PIKE — No closed season in Great Lakes, Georgian Bay, North Channel and their intervening international connecting waters and River St. Lawrence, excepting that the Bay of Quinte is closed for pickarel from April 1st to May 14th.

(A) INLAND WATERS — South of and including the French and Mattawa Rivers and Lake Nipissing.

PICKEREL — May 15 to Dec. 31st.
PIKE — May 15th to March 31st.

(B) North and West of and excluding the French and Mattawa

Rivers and Lake Nipissing.
PICKEREL — from May 15th to April 14th next following.

PIKE — No closed season if taken by angling.
The above information will be of interest to those who like to include a little fishing while deer hunting this fall.

We hear that S. T. Faran had double luck recently when he landed two trout at once on a line baited with two hooks.

Peel County Game and Fish Protective Association held their first fall meeting on September 18th at Huttonville Park. Guest speaker of the evening was the Hon. Harold Scott, minister of Lands and Forests. Mr. Scott spoke of the work the Department was doing and he also stressed the fact that it was necessary for the sportsmen to cooperate with the Department in every way.

Speaking of Fish Hatcheries, Mr. Scott claimed the present amount of hatcheries adequate providing there were enough rearing ponds throughout Ontario to keep the fish fry cleared from the hatcheries.
