Free Tuberculosis Survey Planned for Georgetown

Every man, woman and child (high school) in the Georgetown area will be given the opportunity of safeguarding their health by having a free chest x-ray when a community x-ray survey begins here 29th October, 1947. Announced last night, the survey will be conducted by the Lions Club on the 29th, 30th, 31st of October under the auspices of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association.

In order that Georgetown citizens may be registered for the survey, a house-to-house canvass will be made before the actual survey gets under way.

The Georgetown survey is part of the war on tuberculosis begun by the Ontario Tuberculosis Association in cooperation with the Ontario Department of Health to cut in half the incidence of this disease in Ontario within the next ten years.

An x-ray will take only a few moments of each person's time. The most up to date mobile equipment, which uses 70 mm. film and can handle 100 persons an hour will be used. These miniature plates, when read by experts, are just as accurate as full-size x-rays. An improvement in the taking of mass survey films has been introduced in that it is not necessary to remove clothing. However, women are requested to wear, as far as possible, simple upper garments without ornaments and buttons. They will be required to remove only their coats. Men will be requested to remove their suit coats and vests, dropping suspenders over the shoulders.

Tuberculosis of the lungs, if found in the early stages and treated, is almost always completely curable. Nevertheless, nearly as many Canadians died from this disease during the war as were killed by enemy action. More persons die from tuberculosis in Ontario than from all other infectious diseases combined. Many of these were needless deaths. Tuberculosis is a disease that can be controlled he said. But it is highly contagious, but it is highly not discovered until it has reached advanced stages. Only the x-ray plate can discover the disease at this early stage.

Further plans regarding the Georgetown survey will be announced as they are completed. In the meantime, public health officials are most anxious that everyone give the project their whole-hearted co-operation. With this co-operation they are convinced that Georgetown will be well in the forefront of Ontario communities in the prevention of tuberculosis.

COMMUNITY MOURNS DEATH OF POPULAR MERCHANT

Proprietor of a meat and grocery store in Georgetown for the past twenty-five years, Clarence James Buck passed away in Toronto General Hospital on Saturday morning, September 27th, after an illness of some several weeks duration. Born in Georgetown, he was a son of the late James M. Buck. He attended public and high school here and was a second year student at the School of Practical Science, University of Toronto, at the time of his father's death in 1923, when he returned to take over the business.

Mr. Buck was one of the most popular of Georgetown merchants and enjoyed a good patronage at his attractive store on Mill Street. He was a member of the United Church and an executive member of the Board of Trade.

Surviving are his wife, formerly Elizabeth Caldwell and two children, Joan and Jim. He also leaves his mother, two brothers and three sisters, Sholto, Mrs. James Young (Erma) and Mrs. Langford Jones (Merle) of Toronto, Mrs. W. T. Graham (Carrie) of Norval, and Jack of Owen Sound. He was predeceased by one brother, Harold.

Rev. R. C. Todd conducted the funeral service from the McClure Funeral Home on Monday. There were many beautiful floral tributes and Mrs. H. C. Wrigglesworth sang "The City Four-Square" during the service. Pall-bearers were Harold Bell, Alfred Cole, Ray Orlinton, Sid Morris, Fred Cole and Pat Vance. Local business firms closed for an hour during the funeral service as a token of respect. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

The Salvation Army is at Humanity's Service 24 Hours of the Day

The Salvation Army's work of "re-conversion of men" is taking on increased importance as responsible men and women today plan how best they can cope with the numerous problems of the post-war world. By "re-conversion of men" is meant The Salvation Army's work with discharged or paroled prisoners.

During the past year the Salvation Army accepted responsibility for 194 parolees, and no fewer than 1,984 persons were committed to The Army's care from Canadian courts.

A total of 4,213 prisoners were helped to find jobs, and were restored to their homes. Many prisoners' families were helped with financial assistance or counselling.

The Salvation Army pioneered in work in behalf of prisoners 65 years ago, when Army Officers waited outside prison-gates to offer assistance to discharged prisoners, and when the first "prison-gates" homes were set up by the Salvation Army for moneyless or friendless discharged prisoners.

Today, this organization has become a recognized agency in the field of criminology and its services to the man behind the bars form a semi-official adjunct of this country's penal system.

Prison officials place almost no restrictions on the type of work that The Salvation Army carries on inside prisons and these activities take the form of band programs, lectures, motion pictures, prayer meetings and evangelistic meetings; personal visits to prisoners, and distributions of books and magazines, including textbooks, religious books and the Bible.

The Army concludes their Georgetown Appeal this Saturday, Oct. 4th with a Tag Day under the able direction of Mrs. R. T. Paul, and her workers. Taggers will be out bright and early Saturday morning and Georgetown Citizens can be counted upon to see the "Army of The Helping Hand" reach their objective.
