Free Tuberculosis Survey Planned for Georgetown

Every man, woman and child (high school) in the Georgetown area will be given the opportunity of safeguarding their health by having free chest x-ray when a community x-ray survey begins here 29th October. 1947. Announced last night, the survey, will be conducted by the Lions Club on the 29th, 30th, 31st of October under the auspices of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association.

In order that Georgetown citizens may be registered for the survey. house-to-house canvass will be made before the actual survey gets under

The Georgetown survey is part of the war on tuberculosis begun by the Ontario Tuberculosis Association in cooperation with the Ontario Department of Health to cut in half the incidence of this disease in Ontario within the next ten years.
