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## J. B. Mackenzie, Contractor, Dies Was Mayor Here 1930-34

A prominent Georgetown man, who gave freely of his time for public service, John Boyd Mackenzie died in his sleep at his home on Mill Street on Sunday morning, October 5th. Head of the contracting firm of J. B. Mackenzie and Son, Mr. Mackenzie leaves many monuments behind to his successful career as a builder. Such structures as the Post Office, the Roxy Theatre building, the Mackenzie Building, Richardson's Hardware and Parnell's Store were of his construction, as well as dozens of houses both here and in Acton, where the firm maintains a branch.

Born in Esqueusing Township 71 years ago, "J. B." as he was familiarly known, was the son of the late Samuel Mackenzie and Barbara Boyd. He attended Dublin School and learned the carpentry trade at an early age, working first around the countryside, then establishing a small shop in Acton. In 1910, he bought out H. P. Lawson's planing mill here. Forty years ago, he married the former Eliza McQueen and in 1915 they moved from Acton to make their home in Georgetown. The business prospered and in 1935 adopted the present name of J. B. Mackenzie and Son.

After serving for four years as a Council member, Mr. Mackenzie became mayor of Georgetown in 1930 and served as chief magistrate for the next four years. He was instrumental during his term of office in keeping relief costs down by a program of work projects and private collections for relief. He was a member for ten years of the Public School Board and as a member of the Board of Management of Knox Presbyterian Church, was one of those who arranged installation of the Lawson Memorial Chimes at the Church. A charter member of the Lions Club, he was one of the sponsors of the community Christmas tree which the club took over from the Public School Board. He served in 1927 as president of the Ontario Retail Lumber Dealers' Association.

Mr. Mackenzie was a member of Walker Masonic Lodge, Acton, and of Halton Chapter, Georgetown. He was an enthusiastic golfer and was a familiar figure on the greens at the Georgetown and Brampton clubs. An avid reader and good conversationalist, he had a fund of anecdotes about his early life in Georgetown and Acton. He often recalled his first job in Georgetown as being the remodelling of the Willoughby livery stables (the building which now houses the Legion Hall and Tom Hewson's Garage) and that at the time W. H. Wright millionaire mining owner of the Toronto Globe and Mail, was driving the livery wagon for Mr. Willoughby. Other early jobs contracted included the building of the Georgetown Coated Paper, now a part of the Alliance Mill, and the present Clay Products building.

Mr. Mackenzie leaves besides his wife, a family of four children, Sam of Georgetown, Kenneth of Acton, and Jean and Margery at home. There are four grandchildren. An only sister, Mrs. Mary Millard, lives in Quebec. Rev. C. C. Cochrane, assisted by Rev. R. C. Todd, conducted the funeral service from his home on Tuesday and pallbearers were fellow lodge members, Walter Rigg, Cyril Brandford and Ed Francis of Georgetown and Amos Mason, Sam Snow and J. M. Steele of Acton. At the graveside in Greenwood cemetery, the Masonic service was conducted under the joint direction of W.M. Charles Leatherland, of Walker Lodge and W. M. Trygve Wold of Credit Lodge.

Local business firms closed for an hour during the funeral service as a token of respect.

## What Council Did

ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 6th

Went to his home as a group before the meeting opened to pay their respects to a former councillor and mayor, the late J. B. Mackenzie.

Granted a request of Knox Presbyterian Church to remove two trees and prune three others on town property near the church. Rev. G. C. Cochrane and James Kennedy made the request. (Moved by Lyons and Eason)

Set Monday, November 2nd at 7.30 p.m. as date for a court of revision to hear appeals against the 1948 assessment. Members of the Court are Cms. James Goodlet, Harry Hale, Arthur Herbert, Thos. L. Lyons and Reeve Alex MacLaren. (Moved by Armstrong and Hale)

Will install sewerage facilities in Wartime Housing Project No. 2 instead of individual septic tanks as originally planned. Dr. Mathew, County M.C.O.H. had objected to septic tanks because of unsuitable soil. Until sewerage is ready, the project will be serviced by two large temporary central tanks. Central Mortgage and Housing will pay half the cost of installing the tanks and will pay for sewerage outlets from sewer lateral to houses. (Moved by MacLaren and Goodlet. Thompson voted against.)

Authorized the Town Solicitor to offer up to \$50 to Harold Cleave for a piece of property at the entrance to Wartime Housing Project No. 2. (Moved by Armstrong and Hale)

Received a complaint from John McBean that merchandise displayed by a neighbouring merchant overstepped his property and interfered with display value of his show window. He asked Council to introduce regulations for the prevention and control of such difficulty. Cr. Goodlet (to whom the letter referred) said he was quite willing to take his merchandise off the street if all others were required to do the same. It was left in his hands to see other merchants who followed a similar procedure and see what could be done.

Asked Branch 120, Canadian Legion, to name the new street in Wartime Housing Project No. 2.

Authorized issue of \$30,000 in debentures for improvements and artificial ice installation in Georgetown Memorial Arena. Debentures will be 3 per cent 10 year, payable in equal annual instalments. (First reading moved by Herbert and Goodlet; Second and third reading moved by Lyons and Thompson)

Decided that no anonymous letters received by Council would be given any consideration.

Changed the question to be submitted to electors this December about an annual grant to the band, from one mill to \$1500. (Moved by MacLaren and Eason)
