

IMPORTANCE OF X-RAY FOR T.B. STRESSED

The importance of the free X-ray survey to each Georgetown citizen which begins here at the Oddfellows Hall, October 29th conducted by the local Lions Club is stressed by the Dept. of Health.

Tuberculosis is one of the most curable of diseases if it is not too far advanced when discovered and if prompt treatment is given.

Prevention of this disease means the use of x-ray. In its early stages tuberculosis does not produce symptoms. An affected person is usually not conscious of being ill. And it is only when the disease has progressed that the person becomes aware of something amiss and consults his physician.

Until mobile clinic equipment of the type coming to Georgetown was available, chest clinics confined their services to persons known to have tuberculosis, and those with whom they associated. As a result only one in five persons suffering from the disease was discovered in its early stages. Mass surveys of apparently healthy persons have discovered more than twice the number of such cases.

Once the x-ray demonstrates tuberculosis, proper treatment can be started at a sanatorium, and just as important the affected person can be removed from the company of those who might get the disease from him.

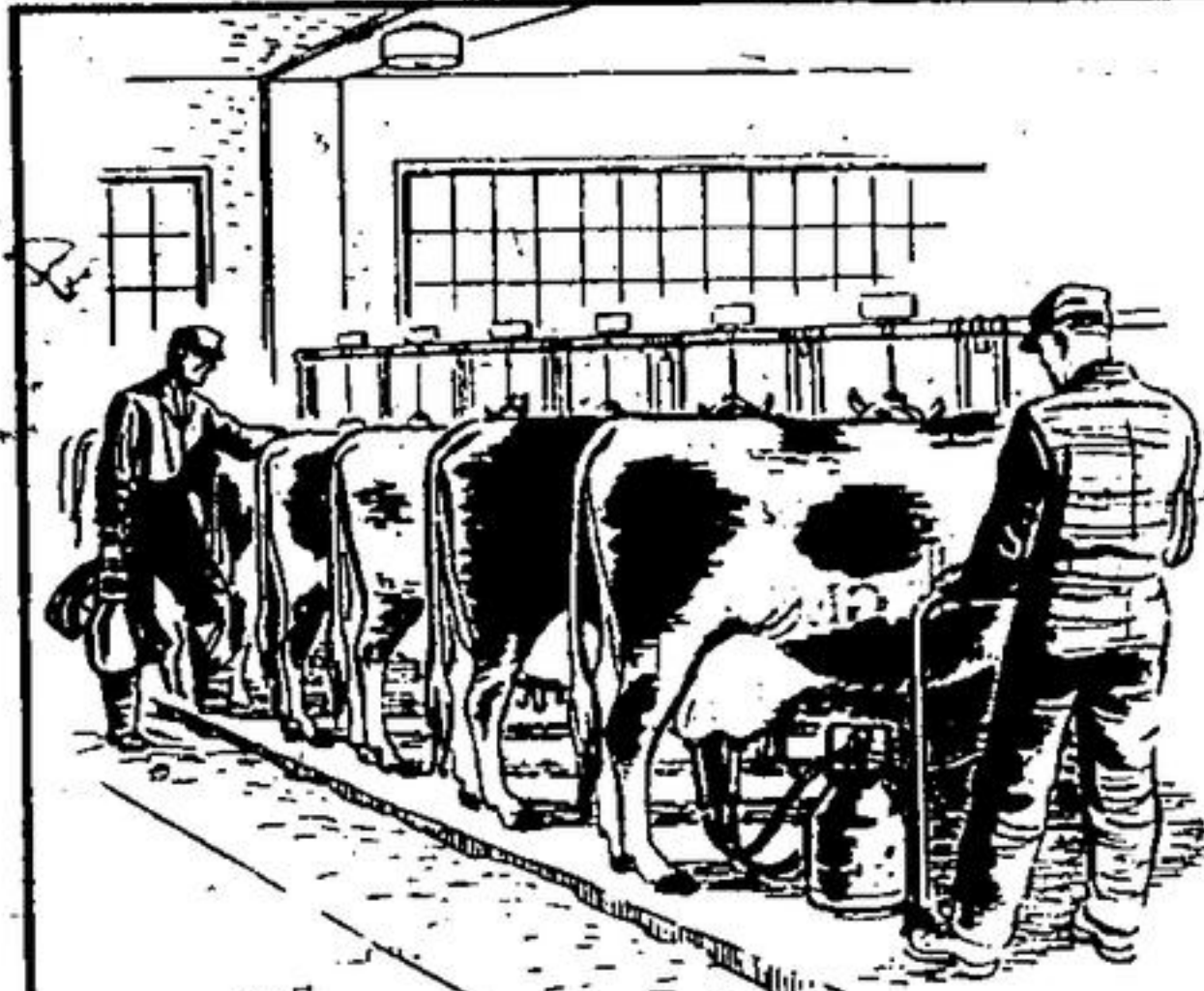
There are two reasons why local residents should make appointments for their x-rays. First, because it is good to know one's chest is healthy, and second, the discovery of the disease in its early stages means complete recovery if correct treatment is begun at once.

In its intensive fight to stamp out tuberculosis, the Province of Ontario is spending \$2,500,000 each year. Tuberculosis is an economic problem as well as a human problem, for the cost of treating a patient is approximately \$5,000. In the case of wage earners, an additional expenditure of \$2,500 is required to support the family.
