The Editor's Column

WHY NO MEETINGS HERE?

An item in last week's Erif Advocate reports that the Wellington County High School Area consultative committee is arranging a series of public meetings in various centres in the county with the object of having larger high school areas organized. The Erin editor comments: "During the summer vacation the discussions on this provocative question quieted down and folks were of the opinion that it might be let lie for some time at least, but it appears that the Department of Education has brought pressure to bear to force the issue further. Parents and students in the local area are with few exceptions in favour of keeping Erin Continuation School operating in preference to the proposed larger school."

We particularly note that the people of Wellington County are not to have high school districts rammed down their throats without at least some opportunity for citizens in general to express themselves at public meetings. Perhaps if that were the case in Halton, our neighbouring municipalities would not have blindly rushed into such a radical change on the say-so of their councils and school boards, bewitched by smooth-talking Department of Education spokesmen. We trust that the people of Erin and of other Wellington Centres will not be misled into the same paths that Milton and Acton have taken.

CONGRATULATIONS

Halton County has been in the baseball spotlight in a big way this year with three teams from as many towns showing plenty of class. Milton Juniors have already won the Ontario crown and this week decides whether it will be three Ontario championships in the county. One of these is practically assured, as Acton soundly trounced Delhi on Saturday and should easily take their game in that town this afternoon to take over the Intermediate "C" championship. Oakville, meanwhile is playing its last of a two-game series for the Intermediate 'B" championship in Oakville this afternoon against Meaford, having won the first game,

Added to the outstanding hockey record which teams from Georgetown and Acton have chalked up in the past, the baseball record this year establishes Halton as one of the leading sporting counties of the province, and we congratulate our three neighbouring towns for the honours they are bringing to themselves and the county.
