James Gordon Taggart has been appointed Director-in-chief, Agricultural Services, Dominion Department of Agriculture, highest post in the Dominion Civil Service ever to be filled by open competitive examination. Born on a Nova Scotia farm, educated in Ontario, first Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, Swift Current, Saskatchewan, and former Saskatchewan Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Taggart is regarded as one of the best informed Canadian agricultural lenders. His chairmanship of the Meat Board and service as Foods Administrator were recognized by the award of C.B.E. in 1946. Since the formation of the Agricultural Prices Support Board, almost two years are, he has been its Chairman

Halton Donated \$1.01 Per Capita to British Flood Relief

In a statement released this week, Stanley Hall, M.P.P. revealed that Halton County residents had contributed 10,680 pounds of food, 31,680 pounds of clothing and \$1335.20 in cash to the Ontario British Flood Relief campaign last spring. The local committee, headed by J. Arnott Early, met with a good response from the public and Georgetown was well to the fore with 900 pounds of food, 2400 pounds of clothing, and \$171.37 in cash.

Valuing food donations at a 10c a pound basis and clothing at \$1.00 a pound, the county population of 29,268 contributed \$1.01 per capita to help Britishers in less fortunate circumstances.
