Rev. J. E. Reid was Former Toronto Presbytery Moderator

Minister of Alhambra United Church, Toronto, for 37 years and former Moderator of Toronto Presbytery, Rev. J. Ewing Reid dled at his home, 314 Indian Road, after a lengthy illness.

Born in Georgetown, Mr. Reid was one of a family of eleven children of the late Henry Reid and Eliza Scott. He received his early education at Norval and Guelph Collegiate. He taught school for a time before attending the University of Toronto where he graduated in Arts in 1903 and in theology in 1905 from Knox

Mr. Reid began his career in the ministry at Royce Avenue Mission where he held services in a secondhand tent. In 1909 he took over Alhambra Presbyterian Church, which later joined the United Church under his guidance. He continued to serve this charge until his retire-

ment in June of 1946. Always active in church affairs, he was a past president of the ministerial Association, Toronto, as well as Educational Committee of Toronto Conference.

Mr. Reid also took an active interest in sports and enjoyed curling. golf and fishing trips. He was a l member and past master of Kilwinning Lodge, A.F. & A.M., and served as chaplain for some time.
