Present Status of Pheasants

(continued from last week)
Once the Dept. of Game and Fisheries took over the task of introducing pheasants it will be seen that efforts were no longer desultory. Eggs and birds distributed ran into hundreds of thousands. The essential facts about the potentialities of the province for pheasants began to appear. All parts of the province were included in the distribution, but all were not equally suited for pheasants. It became evident that the birds fed on the ground and were going to survive in winter only where they could feed continuously on the ground. In some places they thrived, and in others they were a complete failure. A somewhat elaborate division of the Province with respect to pheasant success may be made as follows:

1. No survival without artificial winter feeding. This includes the major portion of the province. In some suburban areas, garbage dumps may winter populations of two or three to twenty or thirty pairs, but were these eliminated all birds would die.
2. Normal survival of some birds, but conditions always adverse and periodic winter-killing of the entire population may be expected.
3. Population can always survive the winter, but high levels are not normally attained. A band across southern Ontario is included.
4. Stable populations developed, but high levels not attained. Such areas, which are frequent in southern Ontario, may be considered deficient normal range, where population might be expected to be increased by improving the environment.
5. Excellent population attained on what may be called effective pheasant range. The Niagara fruit belt and some other portions of extreme southern Ontario are in this category.
6. Optimum range for the species, found in Ontario on Pelee Island. It is plain that pheasant management must concern itself only with the last four types. In all of these shootable stock has actually been produced or production may be hoped for. Even in Pelee Island there may be some prospect of improving the range. Commencing in 1937 and 1938 a system of controlled shooting was set up in much of the good pheasant range of Ontario, patterned on a controlled hunt that was put in operation at an earlier date on Pelee Island.

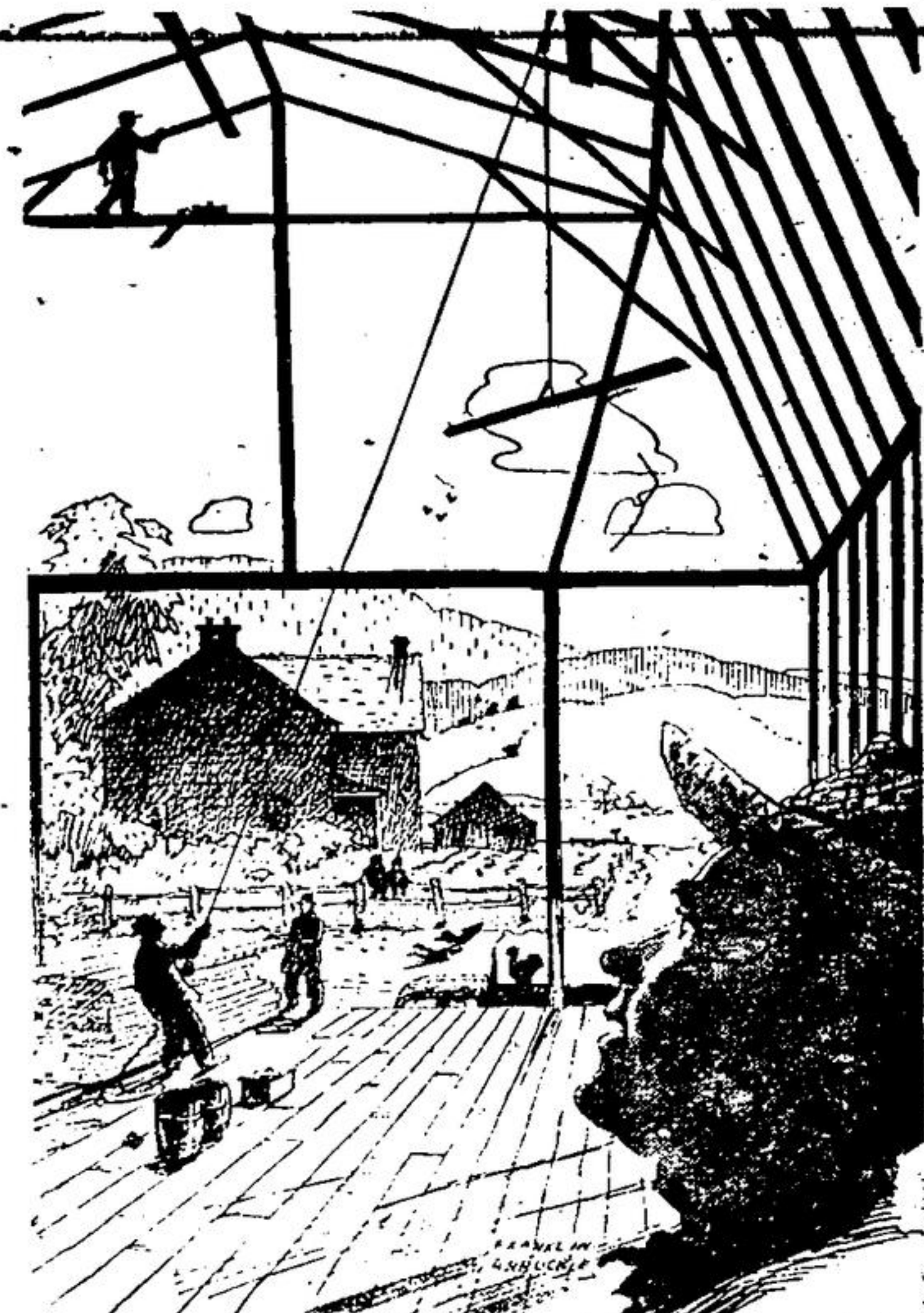

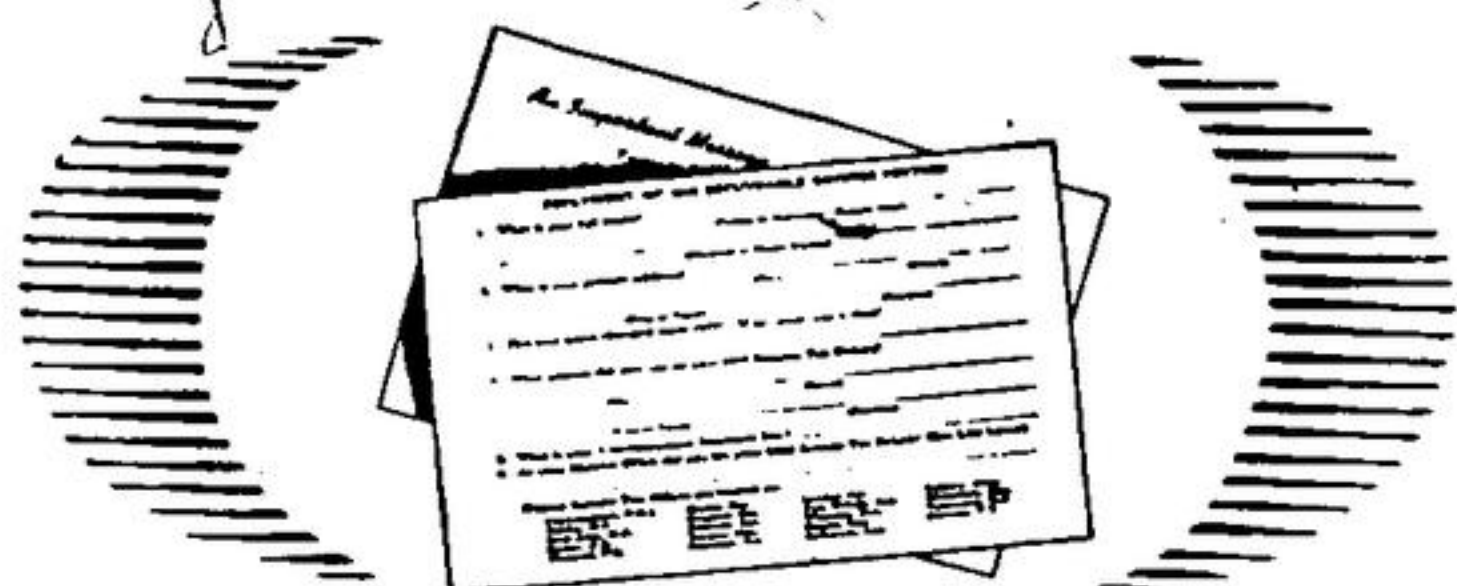
