**CBC Women's Interests**  
A firm belief that women can help build peace through international understanding is a guiding force in the work of Elizabeth Long, director of women's interests for the CBC.

As a planner of network radio programs, Miss Long looks to every corner of the world for speakers who can tell Canadian listeners—especially homemakers—how people of other countries work and play and think. "All women have something in common," she declares, "and I think that through women speaking to other women, by means of radio, we can show that boundary lines and oceans are no barrier to understanding."

In recent CBC programs planned by Elizabeth Long, women from many countries have given their views on how young girls of today should be educated, told how families throughout the world spend their annual vacation and discussed the political status of women in other lands.

Frequently a Canadian representative and speaker at conferences of the International Council of Women, Miss Long was elected this fall as world convener of broadcast-

ing for the ICW, when 1,000 women from 43 countries met in Philadelphia. Miss Long also works closely with the radio sub-committee of the International Federation of University Women.

A native of Winnipeg, and graduate of the University of Manitoba, Elizabeth Long joined the CBC in 1938. Before that she had served as women's editor of the Winnipeg Free Press and assistant editor of the Free Press Prairie Farmer. She was also Winnipeg correspondent for several national monthly publications, and wrote short stories and articles on a freelance basis.
