. Voters Favor \$1200 Annual Grant to Brass Band

Goodlet Heads Polls, Whitmee Edges Lyons in Ward 3 Vote

Board of Education, Band Grant, Get Large Majority-Voters Do Not Favour General Council Election.

Ward 8, traditional election centre in municipal elections, was the only ward to vote on Monday for Council and voting was heavy, with 480 voters casting ballots of an estimated six hundred qualified voters. The same three men contested the two Council seats as last year and once again Cr. James Goodlet led the polls with 225. Second place was extremely close, and Ray Whitmee scored a four-vote victory over Cr. Thos. L. Lyons, with 198 to 194. Last year the results were Goodlet 234; Lyons 196; Whitmee, 128.

While Council, School Trustees and Hydro Commissioner were elsewhere elected by acclamation, all voters had the opportunity of voting on three important questions, but little interest in these was shown in Wards 1 and 2, only 54 casting ballots in Ward 1 and 72 in Ward 2. There are 424 and 775 registered in the Voters List in the wards.

Majority approval of granting \$1200 annually to the band forming a Board of Education was expressed. Electing Councillors by general vote rathern than wards had a slight majority in Ward 3, was defeated by opposition vote in the other wards.

Born seventy-one years ago in Bathurst Township, Lanark County, he was the son of the late William Cameron and Caroline Carroll. He attended public and high school in Perth and received his B.A. degree from Queen's University, in Kingston, in 1908. He gradusted in 1906 from Queen's Theological College and in 1988 received the B.D. degree from Queen's. He was an active supporter of Queen's Theological Alumnas Association. He was a member and past moderator of Kingston Presty-

Mr. Cameron retired from the ministry in 1945 after serving eighteen years as minister of St. John's Presbyterism church in Pittsburgh Township near Kingston, a charge which also included the church at Sandhill.
