#### PLAN FOR SOCIAL EVENTS EARLY IN 1948

The Directors and lady directors of the Esqueing Agricultural Society met last Thursday evening at the home of the President Craig Reid, and following a very enthusiastic discussion on fall fair activities a social hour was spent with lunch being served.

While the auditor's report has not yet been submitted, the directors felt justly proud as they reviewed a tentative statement of the finances and looked back over another successful year in the show business. They were grateful for the support being accorded the fair, and thankful to the many old and new exhibitors who are taking a greater interest in this century-old institution and one that is doing much to advertise the town.

\$75.00 in cash prizes were passed to cover the awards in the husking corn competitions. First prize was set at \$15.00, second \$10.00, and seven prizes of \$6.00 each. Among the suggestions put forth, which will later be brought before the 1948 board of directors, included a concrete loading chute in the park, whereby valuable animals may be loaded on trucks without any danger, the rental of starting gates for the harness races, and larger prizes in some of the hall classes, i.e., vegetables and domestic science.

The annual meeting and election of the 1948 directorate was set for Saturday, January 24.

The directors decided to hold another dinner, this year early in January, and will ask the Honby W. I. to cater for this. Last year this social event was held in Limehouse, but the directors decided to move these socials around to different parts of the township. The annual evening and dance is also scheduled for Norton Parish Hall early in the new year. Miss C. McCullough, Miss H. J. Hunter, Messrs. James Fisher and Spencer Wilson were appointed a committee to arrange for the banquet, and Misses Marjorie Gault and Doris Harding and Messrs. Nels Robinson and John MacNabb a committee to ar-

range for the euchre and dance. The secretary passed around the pictures taken at the fair and some complimentary remarks were passed.

The annual Fall Fairs' convention will be held in Toronto in February.
