What Halton Council Did ON TUESDAY, DECEMBER 9th

Appointed Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson for another three-year term on Georgetown High School Board. Other school board appointments included Nelson Pickett, North Halton School Area, one year; Ross Segsworth, Burlington-Nelson, three years.

Endorsed a resolution presented by Elgin County to nationalize sweepstakes, or failing this, to adopt them provincially. Reeve Alex Maclaren of Georgetown stood alone in opposing the resolution.

Favoured immediate treatment of sex perverts and sent a resolution stating this to the Ontario Dep't. of Health.

Were informed by Nelson Township that with 2162 voters, the Nelson reeve now has an extra vote.

Endorsed a Lanark County resolution for immediate action to be taken to remedy the serious situation of feed shortage and high costs.

Were asked by Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock if council would assist in a campaign being conducted by the Halton Federation of Agriculture and Livestock Improvement Association to have all grade and thoroughbred cattle vaccinated against Bang's disease. Council voted to pay canvassers twenty-five cents for every herd signed up.

Expressed appreciation to retiring Warden N. R. Craig for his work on Council during the year.

DOROTHY WEBSTER PRIZEWINNER AT MIMICO ART SHOW

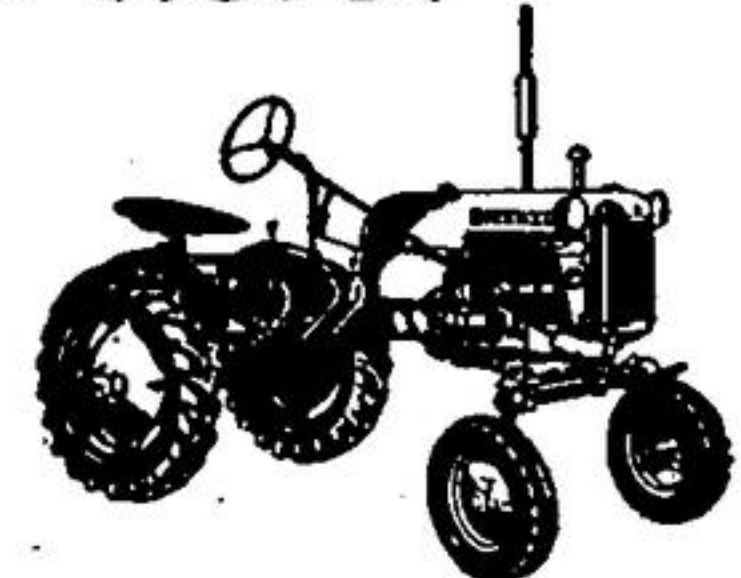
