Could we beg of you, madam, in the name of our 160 children ranging from one day to three years old, from those around you, something for their Christmas tree.

For the first time since the liberation we are terribly in need of many things for their Christmas and with scarcity of everything with high prices. I wonder if I am indiscreet in making this appeal; but it was your affectionate manner that led me to make the request.

We are in a landing zone which slows up everything around here. For instance, we have Valouquet at 18 kilometres and Sainte Marie du Mont (Utah Beach) at about the same distance.

An important amendment to the Municipal Act will be of interest in view of the forthcoming Requesting Township nomination meeting on December 29th and is reproduced below for the guidance of township ratepayers. The new section says:

"When a proposed candidate is not present, his nomination paper shall not be valid unless there is attached thereto evidence satisfactory to the returning officer that he consents to be so nominated." (Section 68 of the Municipal Act, 1947).
