**PEEL MOURNS PASSING OF DAVID WILSON**

David Wilson, Peel County clerk for about 19 years, died at his home 12 Victoria Terrace, Brampton, on Tuesday, December 16th. In failing health for the past year, he continued to carry out the duties of his responsible position until shortly before his death.

Born in Albion Township, a son of the late Henry Wilson and Margaret Wallace, he was in his 78th year. He received his education at what is now known as Coventry School and later farmed in King Township and subsequently near the village of Bolton. In 1898 he married Rebecca Hudson, of Castlegory. The couple would have marked their 50th wedding anniversary next March.

Mr. Wilson was Reeve of Albion Township in 1915, 16 and 17 and again in 1928. He held this office until June of 1929 when he resigned to accept the appointment as County clerk. The following year he moved to Brampton where he established residence.

A member of Grace United Church, Mr. Wilson was Church Treasurer for a number of years. He was Secretary of the Mothers' Allowance and Old Age Pension Board in the county for many years and was well and favorably known for the efficient and conscientious manner in which he discharged his duties in this capacity. Up to the time of his death he was Secretary-Treasurer of the Peel County Health Unit, which position he had occupied since the inception of that body.

For several years he was chairman of the Board of Governors of Peel Memorial Hospital. It was while Mr. Wilson occupied this position in 1938 that he instituted a program of beautification for the hospital grounds. As a result of his efforts, the hospital is now situated in the midst of a beautiful park. Mr. Wilson undertook a canvass to raise money for the planting of trees in the grounds. There were 126 persons contributed to the original David Wilson program and a tree was planted in the name of each of the donors. The splendid beautification scheme has greatly enhanced the appearance of the Hospital grounds and the park will long remain as a living tribute to his memory.

Surviving are his widow, two daughters, Mrs. Roy Arlow (Margaret), of Woodbridge, Mrs. George A. Bowes (Annie), Brampton, two sons, Hudson H. and Henry, both of Albion; three sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Wilson, Toronto, Mrs. Sarah Elliott, and Mrs. H. H. Hudson, both of Bolton; and 12 grandchildren.
