MISS EMMA HOWSON DIES IN MEAFORD

Miss Emma H. Howson, a former resident of Georgetown, died in Meaford on Thursday, December 18 at the age of 88. She was a daughter of the late Thomas Foster Howson and Isabella Atkinson and was born in 1859 at Hornby. She later lived at Glamis in Bruce County. Miss Howson trained as a nurse at Eansville, Pennsylvania and was for many years on the staff of the sanitarium there. In 1933 she came to Georgetown to make her home with her sister on Charles Street. Following her sister's death, she moved to Meaford.

She was a member of Georgetown Baptist Church during her residence here. One of a family of eleven children, she is survived by one sister, Mrs. S. K. Ruddell of Georgetown.

The funeral service at the McClure Funeral Home on Friday was conducted by Rev. Fred Ainsworth, assisted by Rev. C. R. Gower. Pallbearers were six nephews, Arthur Ruddell, Ashgrove, Thomas Corrie, Dr. Leslie Black and Edgar Ruddell, Toronto. M. E. Peacock, Meaford, and W. P. Laidlaw, Noyral. Interment was made in Ashgrove Cemetery.

PLACE FOR FRONT PLATE

Motorists are advised by the Ontario Motor Vehicle Licences branch to check their equipment to make sure they have the front licence bracket to carry the new 1948 plates which are to be issued for front and rear of the vehicle. During the war years and including this year, only the rear plates have been carried on vehicles.

J. P. Bickell, registrar of motor vehicle licences, explained that many vehicles, even new vehicles, are not equipped with the front bracket. Owners of older cars in some instances have been found to have discarded the front brackets.
