SHOES HARD TO FILL

"His shoes will be hard to fill" seems to epitomize public feeling at learning of the resignation of Mr. P. B. Harrison as clerk-treasurer of the municipality, a position which he has so capably filled for twenty-three years. In over two decades in office, he has been a tower of strength to council after council, with a fund of municipal knowledge always available to draw from, both for important decisions and for the countless small details which are so essential in keeping municipal affairs running smoothly in the town. As Mayor Gibbons said, in reading his letter of resignation to Council, the town clerk holds the key position of municipal government. Councils may come and go, their members may have varied degrees of knowledge and interest in municipal matters, but it is to the clerk that we look to really administer town affairs. Councils make decisions—the clerk carries them out.

The new clerk, whoever he may be, will have much to learn before he can gain the knowledge which Mr. Harrison has acquired. He will be fortunate in having the retiring clerk to instruct him in the duties of the office and to assist him from time to time with some of the details which might otherwise be overlooked.

A SUCCESSFUL DRAW

From all angles, the annual Christmas draw of the Georgetown Lions Club was the most successful yet. It was a perfect winter's day, Santa Claus arrived sharp on the dot of his announced time, and the bags of candies distributed to the children were amply filled.
