William Marchington, Noted Newsman, Dies

William Marchington, former chief
of the Toronto Globe Bureau in Ot-
tawa and later editorial writer for
the Globe and Mail, died suddenly
at his home in Port Dover on Dec-
ember 26th. He had been in ill
health for several years and had re-
tired from newspaper work two
years ago.

Born at Dove Holes, Derbyshire,
England, 58 years ago, he joined
the Globe staff as a young man
and served continuously with that
paper with the exception of three
years with the Toronto Daily Star.
In the first war he was an overseas
correspondent. During his lengthy
Ottawa residence he earned praise
from members of all parties in the
House for his honesty and fairness
in political reporting.

A brother of Harry Marchington,
R. R. 1, Georgetown, he is survived
by his wife, formerly Nellie Grant
Smith; two sons, John of Norwood
and James of Toronto; a daughter
Christine of Toronto; his mother,
Mrs. S. A. Marchington, Bolsover,
Ontario; a sister, Mrs. Joseph Ford,
Bolsover, and four other brothers,
Robert, Fred and Arthur of Toron-
to and Frank of Ottawa.

Funeral services were held in
Port Dover on Monday with inter-
ment in Port Dover Cemetery.
