**BAND GRANT OUT,
 NEW VOTE NECESSARY**

A \$1200 annual grant to the Georgetown brass band, voted in by a 326-102 vote at the December 8th election, does not stand and a new vote will be necessary. Mayor Joseph Gibbons announced this in his inaugural address to Council last week and the matter was further discussed at a Council meeting last Wednesday.

In the December 8th vote, every qualified voter on the roll was allowed to cast a ballot. Under the new by-law, prepared under section 405, subsection 65 of the Municipal Act, only voters qualified as voters on money matters will be allowed an expression of opinion at the polls.

The question was discussed at some length last Wednesday when Cr. Whitmee said there was a feeling in the town that the municipality is recognizing one band and neglecting the Girls' Pipe Band.

Herbert — You cannot draw a comparison between the two bands. The Girls' Pipe Band have done a fine job at small fairs, etc., but this can't be compared with the long prize-winning record of the brass band.

Whitmee — However, we're going to have this thrown at us. I think the band is worthy of a mill the girls' band too?

Goodlet — They aren't asking for grants, but shouldn't we consider anything.

Armstrong — The cost of operating a brass band is much greater than for pipes. Instruments are more

valuable, there is no one here qualified to make repairs, and music is more expensive.

Maclaren — To meet this criticism wouldn't it be wise to include in our by-law a small grant to the Pipe Band?

Armstrong — They aren't asking for it, if they do, I would be prepared to give it consideration.

Gibbons — I think we should ask a committee from the Pipe Band to meet with us to discuss finances.

Goodlet — The brass band doesn't get this money. It's an assurance of the bandmaster's salary.

Maclaren — I think the Mayor's suggestion a good one, but I hate to raise the money question.

Davison — We'd be sticking our necks out.

Armstrong — If they want a grant they should come to us.

McCumber — I understand they are thinking of buying a... but it doesn't look as if they need money.

The matter of a grant to the Pipe Band was then dropped and a motion passed asking the town solicitor to prepare a proper by-law for a \$1200 grant to the brass band, which would be submitted to the electors at an early date.
