The Annual Vestry Meeting of St. Alban's Church, Glen Williams, was held in the Parish Hall on Tuesday evening, January 20th, the Rector, Archdeacon Thompson, in the chair.

After the Devotional opening, the Vestry Clerk Mr. Arthur Beaumont, read the minutes of last Vestry, which were adopted. Mr. Mour-lague Merryday, People's Warden, then read the Church's financial statement for 1947, which was a good one, and was adopted by the Vestry.

The report of St. Alban's Ladies Guild was presented by Mrs. Thos. Haines, the president, and showed an excellent year's work by the Guild. The report was adopted, with the Vestry's thanks for the good work done for the church.

The Rector presented a verbal report of the Sunday School, reporting progress and expressing appreciation of the work of Mrs. Williams, Gwep Williams, Jack and Jean Beaumont and of the interest and help rendered by Mr. Tom Beaumont.

The Archdeacon then presented his own report, saying that the Church had had a good year, but hoping for still greater interest and devotion from the Church of England people of the Glen and its environs. He mentioned with appreciation the Churchwardens and officials, Sunday School workers and Guild, and all who had served the Church in the year past. His statistics from the Registers showed baptisms, 9; confirmed, 5; marriages, 1; burials, 3.

Beaumont, Ed Martin, Thos. Hill, Geo. Sargent, Chas. Crawford, Herb. Preston, Jack Beaumont with M. Beaumont convenor.

After Mr. Merryday had read a letter from the Bishop, it was decided to make the Rector a transportation allowance of \$100, and to assume a share in Rectory upkeep. The Rector announced that St. George's Vestry had elected Mr. Arthur Beaumont substitute Lay Delegate to the Synod.

After the benediction, the Vestry adjourned, and the members of the Guild served refreshments.
